THE LATEST NEWS FROM EVERYWHERE

Washington News.

President Harrison has refused a pardon to E. L. Harper, the Cincinnati Fidelity National bank wrecker.

Marthena Harrison, the President's grandchild, has recovered, and the White House quarantine has been lifted.

Fires.

At Clinton, Mo., the largest fire that ever occurred in that city started Tuesday morning in Churchill Bros.' livery stable, which was totally destroyed and fifteen horses burned to death. About a dozen other business houses and offices were completely gutted. The loss will reach \$75,000.

At Fair Haven, Vt., part of the business portion of the town. Loss, \$75,000.

At Fort Hamilton, near Brooklyn, N. Y., the Grand View Hotel. Loss, \$100,000; no insurance.

During the past three weeks more than \$2,000,000 has been lost by fire in Boston.

At Tehuila City, Mass., the business portion of the city. Loss, \$100,000; insurance \$37,000.

Disasters, Accidents and Fatalities.

At Baltimore, the wife and two children of Owen Rice, auditor of the Pennsylvania railway, were burned to a crisp by the explosion of a gasoline stove.

An Erie train collided with a sleigh at Passaic, N. J., and Miss Mary Bryan and Miss Mary Splain were killed. Mrs. Thomas O'Brien was fatally hurt.

Two boys named Sullivan and Orr were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the home of Sullivan's father at St. George, New Brunswick.

The Dennington and Rutland railroad had a serious accident at Rutland, Vt., by which Edward H. Cobb, of Wallingford, was killed, and Mrs. Herbert Curtis, of Rutland, was severely injured and several other passengers slightly injured.

A boiler explosion wrecked Favor's sawmill at Columbus, Ga., Wednesday. Will Griffin, white, and Titus Heath, colored, were instantly killed. Three others were mortally wounded.

While a party of workmen were crossing the P. W. & B. tracks to board a train at Landith, Del., a freight train struck three of them, instantly killing John W. Watson and S. L. Vicenski and fatally injuring John Johnson.

A negro tramp at Madison, Tenn., accused of a petty theft, was hanged by a mob after he had been almost whipped to death. A station operator with a gun, who attempted to protect the victim, was imprisoned by the crowd.

Central Labor and Industrial.

The grinders employed by the American ax and tool works at Beaver Falls, Pa., have been notified of a sweeping reduction in their wages to take effect February 1.

The Lake Erie & Western yard switchmen's strike at Muncie Ind., is over. They got no support from sympathy strikers, hence their failure.

The new men at Homestead, Pa., are being dropped rapidly and only about 900 remain. Through their incompetency the firm has been obliged to drop them and take back the experienced men.

Legislative.

The Indiana House of Representatives, 60 to 19, concurred in the Senate joint resolution, declaring in favor of keeping the World's Fair open on Sunday.

The Senate of the State of Washington unanimously passed an anti-Pinkerton bill.

The Alabama State Senate has reconsidered its vote of last Tuesday and on Saturday passed a bill giving an annuity of \$500 to Mrs. Jefferson Davis. It now depends on the lower house whether the bill becomes a law.

Missouri's legislature has passed a bill compelling railroad companies to provide separate coaches for white and colored passengers.

Crime and Penalties.

At St. Louis, Frank Henschel shot and probably fatally wounded his sweetheart, Miss Alice Bruce, at her home. The police, looking for the would-be murderer, found his dead body in an alley two blocks away. He was probably crazed by cigarettes.

Personal.

Bishop Brooks died without making a will. His estate is estimated at \$750,000.

Miscellaneous.

Judge John Martin, a Democratic lawyer of Topeka, becomes Senator of Kansas. The latter title was bestowed upon him by the joint convention of the Senate and the Populist house, and he will proceed at once to Washington to take the seat of Senator Perkins, who was appointed by the Governor a year ago to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Plumb.

BEYOND OUR BORDERS.

Five workmen of Halle, Germany, who drank water from the river Saale, contrary to the order of the authorities, were seized with Asiatic cholera.

SOME NEW SENATORS.

Faulkner and Camden Chosen by the West Virginia Legislature.

At Charleston, W. Va., the State Senate and House of Delegates elected two United States Senators. In the Senate the vote for Senator for the full term of six years, be-

ginning March 4, next, Charles J. Faulkner, the present Senator, received 20 votes, Stephen B. Elkins 4. In the House Faulkner received 30, Elkins 28, and O. D. Hill, People's party, 2.

For the unexpired term of the late Senator Kenna, ex-Senator Johnson N. Camden received the same vote as Faulkner in both Houses. Judge Edwin Maxwell received 4

in the Senate 29 in the House and cast his own vote in the House for a fellow delegate, M. W. Burgess. The houses met in joint session and declared the result.

Senator Mills was re-elected in Texas. Stewart in Nevada, and James Smith, Jr., was chosen in New Jersey.

FIRE DAMP'S AWFUL WORK.

Eighty Men Killed and Scores Injured by an Explosion of Gas in a Mine in Bohemia.

Forty miles at Dux, in Bohemia, a mine in which 80 men were killed and scores injured. The explosion occurred when the shifts were changing. A cage full of miners had been lowered half way down the shaft when a loud rumbling report was heard, and the cage and its occupants fell down the shaft. Ten of the men were killed instantly, 10 suffering from fractures from which they cannot recover and five have broken limbs and internal injuries, but will live. They had been half suffocated by the gas rising in the shaft and said that no man could live below.

An hour later the superintendent of the mine and five miners went into the mine. They were unable to go more than 100 yards into the gallery, but they found 14 dead bodies. Of the 60 men who were waiting for the cage, 10 had been killed and 40 partially crushed by falling timbers or half suffocated by the foul air. It is believed 40 men at work in the gallery were also killed by the explosion.

STAMBOUL DETHRONED.

His World's Record Rejected. Kremlin Becomes the King.

Stamboul's grand performance of 2:07 2/5 made on the Stockton, Cal., track on November 23 last, a world famous mile that crowned him king of trotting stallions, has been rejected by the American Trotting Register Association at Chicago. Kremlin who covered a mile at Nashville, Tenn., in 2:07 1/5 on November 12, according to the register is trotting king. Under a resolution all the time performances made at Stockton, Cal., October 13 to November 23, inclusive, stand rejected, but will doubtless constitute bars for trotting purposes.

JUSTICE LAMAR BURIED.

Thousands of People Honor the Memory of the Dead Jurist.

The funeral ceremonies over the late Associate Justice L. Q. C. Lamar took place at Macon, Ga., on Friday. A public meeting was held at the opera house and eulogies were delivered by some of the most prominent members of the bar in this State. The procession from the house to the Methodist church commenced at 11:30. Dr. Chandler, president of the Emory college, where the dead justice graduated, delivered the funeral sermon.

Chief Justice Fuller and the associate justices were present at the services. Thousands of people gathered along the route taken by the funeral cortege and at the church it was impossible to get within 50 yards of the door. All the church bells were kept tolling during the ceremonies. The interment took place about 2:30 p. m., and afterwards Chief Justice Fuller and the Washington party left for home.

The smugglers skulked off, and the one guardsmen was sent back to press men and horses in the King's name to convey the precious treasure to Stranraer.

The officer, pluming himself not a little on his alacrity, sauntered, in stately fashion, round and round his prize, which lay heaped before him in rich profusion, his sword and a brace of formidable pistols at his side.

Presently Maggie McConnell approached the great man, wishing him a good-morning, to which he affably replied, and accepted Maggie's proffered hand. His arm was thrust upward, and at the same time he was encircled by the siren's arms, and with a heavy fall was thrown helplessly on his back.
