

FIFTY-SECOND CONGRESS

Proceedings of the Senate and the House Tensely Told.

FIFTY-THIRD DAY. SENATE—Some of the Senators were in an optimistic mood this morning when the bills making the several appropriations came up.

Mr. Quay moved amendments, which were agreed to, fixing the limit of cost of the public buildings at Allegheny, Pa. at \$550,000.

After an executive session the Senate adjourned. HOUSE—In the House filibustering against the New York & New Jersey Bridge Company bill proved ineffectual today.

SENATE—The consideration of the sundry civil appropriation bill was today resumed, the pending amendments being in regard to the site for a new government printing office building.

Mr. McMillan offered an amendment appropriating \$10,000 for a public building at Jackson, Mich., and it was adopted.

HOUSE—Business was obstructed in the House today by successful filibustering against the Car Coupler bill.

SENATE—Washington's birthday was commemorated in the Senate today by the reading of his farewell address.

HOUSE—The first of what is called a daily series of conflicts between the appropriation bills and the Anti-Open bill, until the latter is acted on, was the feature of today's session of the House.

SENATE—In the Senate today less than an hour two of the general appropriation bills—the diplomatic and consular and the military academy—were read, considered and passed.

HOUSE—On motion of A. Hitt in the relief bill a bill was introduced by George W. Jones, Ill., relating to New Grenada and the United States of Colombia.

SENATE—The debate in the Senate today was over the question whether the Utah Commission, which has been appointed for the last 10 years, should be abolished as proposed by the House.

HOUSE—In the House this morning Mr. Hosman asked for consent for a non-concurrence in the Senate amendments to the sundry Civil Appropriation bill.

SENATE—The legislative appropriation bill passed the Senate today, that body insisting on its amendments, and requesting a conference with the House on the disagreeing votes.

HOUSE—The House today passed the bill for the relief of the States of New York and New Jersey, which was introduced by Mr. Sherman.

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LATER NEWS WAITS.

WASHINGTON.

Mr. Harter of Ohio introduced in the House a free coinage bill which puts silver and gold on the same terms as prior to 1873.

President Harrison by proclamation on Saturday called an extra session of the Senate on March 4 to ratify the cabinet appointments of Mr. Cleveland.

The Arkansas Legislature has passed and sent to the Governor the fellow-servant bill. It compels corporations to assume responsibility for the orders of superiors to injure and permits the recovery of the damages for injuries or death resulting from such work.

Saturday brought to a close the 45 days regular session of the West Virginia Legislature, and no appropriation bills passed.

At San Francisco, John W. Mackay, the famous bonanza mining man and financier, was shot through the back shortly after noon on Friday by a man giving the name of W. C. Rippi, and narrowly escaped death.

Peter L. E. Smith, teller of the First National bank of Wilmington, Del., confessed to the defalcation of \$55,000, and was held in \$20,000 bail.

Carl Nold and Henry Bauer, the Anarchists convicted of conspiracy and accessory to the assault on H. C. Frick, at Pittsburgh were sentenced to five years to the penitentiary by Judge Slagle, on Saturday.

Charles K. Carter has been sentenced at Mt. Vernon, Mo., to hang April 14, next, for the murder of Robert Crockett seven years ago.

At Boston, Mass., Michael McAndrews, the wife-poisoner, was sent to prison for five years.

The strike of the switch tenders of the Chicago & Western Indiana railroad is practically over. The company is putting in new men and the other men in other branches of the service will not go out.

At Barnesville, S. C., on Thursday night, while a colored woman was at a frolic, her five children at home were burned to death. They had been locked in the house which took fire.

The newspapers of St. Petersburg have been officially forbidden to publish any news of the cholera should it reappear in the spring, except the death returns authorized by the imperial authorities.

At St. Petersburg, while a peasant wedding party was crossing the Dnieper on Sunday, the ice broke, and two sledges with 11 persons were swept under the ice and drowned.

King George Tubou, of the Tonga islands, is dead.

A terrible epidemic of diphtheria is raging in Laurel, Del., and a hundred persons have already died from it.

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How to Guess a Woman's Age.
