Can't Save Money.

The pecuniary loss which Governor McKinley has suffered through mistaken confidence in the ability of a friend is in striking contrast with similar reverses which have overtaken many statesmen. Nothing in the character or career of the great protectionist leader goes to show that his embarrassment is due to improvidence. On the contrary, the fact that his social and domestic habits are noted for their Spartan simplicity, and that unlike some of the conspicuous champions of Free Trade to day, he has not mixed public duties with speculative ventures, are evidence that private obligations have been regarded by him with the same sense of honor that has marked every line of his conduct.

Speaking of the debts which a distinguished British premier left behind him McCaulay justly observes that while "it is far better no doubt that a great minister should carry his contempt of money to excess than he should contaminate his hands with unlawful gain," "it is neither right nor becoming in a man to whom the public has given an income more than sufficient for his comfort and dignity to bequeath to that public a great debt, the effect of mere negligence and profusion." The comment is needless to add, has application to victims of

enrment, spent his closing years in debtor's prison. Alexander Hamilton's estate was encumbered when Aaron Burr shot him in that memorable duel which effectually ended Burr's own career, that a public fund was raised for his widow and children.

The last days of James Monroe, were a painful struggle with poverty. Henry Clay was forced to mortgage Ashland for \$50,000 and being unable to meet the lien at maturity his friends raised the sum and paid it. In alluding to Webster's notorious extravagance, Henry Cabot Lodge says: "The result was debt; then a fresh start and more debts and more subscription and funds for his benefit and gifts of money for his table and checks and notes for several thousand dollars." The late W. W. Corcoran, of Washington, sent him \$6,000 in unpaid notes which Webster had made and a \$1,000 check of his own in addition "in token of admiration."

Samuel J. Randall, Roseoe Conkling, James A. Garfield and John A. Logan were all men in whom the desire of acquisitiveness was little developed. Secretary Carlisle is much after the same pattern, his utter indifference to money being one of his striking characteristics. It is one of the inexplicable features of human nature that men of towering genius, like Hamilton should have been unable to manage with success, even with an abundant income their own private affairs.—New York Press.

Brave Words.

The Republican clubs of Canton, Ohio, on Wednesday night gave a tariff banquet to which they invited many distinguished Republicans. Among those who attended was Governor McKinley, and to him was accorded the honor of replying to the toast, "The Republican Presidents." After taking up each illustrious name in turn, Governor McKinley referred to the existing political conditions and said:

"We have now reached in the national pathway the place where the ways turn. Since 1859 until the 4th day of March, this year, the Democratic party has been without power to do anything with public measures without the sanction of the Republican party. In all these years until now they have not had at the same time the legislature and executive branches of government.

They have not divided responsibility. There is no excuse for any room for pretense; no longer any room for hypocrisy. If they believe in themselves and their profession of thirty years they can now make them effective. What they will do I do not know. I cannot know, for they do not know themselves. There is no cause for discouragement on our part. We have but to move on with our old time vigor, yielding nothing of principle. As Mr. Lincoln said, November 19th, 1858: "This fight must go on. The cause must not surrender at the end of one or even a hundred defeats."

Spoken bravely were those brave words. Every true Republican will echo them. Every true man agrees that there is no cause for discouragement in the Republican ranks. The fight will go on and on until the battle is won. Democracy have but gained a temporary advantage. They cannot hold it, for their position towards the people is weak and untenable.
