The County Superintendency.

TO THE SCHOOL DIRECTORS AND FRIENDS OF EDUCATION OF SNYDER COUNTY:

In a few weeks, on May 24, a convention of school Directors of the County will assemble to elect a County Superintendent of the public schools. It will, doubtless, be the aim of every director to select the person who he believes to be best qualified for the office, both in point of scholarship, and in practical experience in the Art of Teaching. A good, successful teacher will make a good, successful Superintendent, while a person without experience, learning, and well established success cannot make a good Superintendent. This is true in every department of life, and it applies in all its force to the office in question.

We request your attention to the record of M. I. Potter as a

candidate for this office. We submit that record with pride and with confidence to the consideration of the directors and all others.

Commencing in the profession in quite early life, he has taught thirteen terms of public school, as follows:

- In 1880-1, at Scottdale, Westmoreland Co., he finished a term for another teacher, teaching four months. In 1881-2 at Everson, Fayette Co., a full term of the primary grade, with 75 pupils. He has taught in all about 75 months of public school, and has had about 1450 pupils under his instruction and care.

On July 31, 1885 he was granted a teacher's professional certificate by the late lamented Prof. Wm. H. Dill, then county superintendent.

On September, 29, 1887, he was granted a teacher's permanent certificate by Dr. E. E. Higbee, then state superintendent of public schools.

He has had active experience in teaching primary, intermediate, grammar and high schools, and has fitted a number of young folks for College.

He is bright, energetic and pro-

gressive, keeping fully abreast of the times in all school work. He possesses the happy faculty of inspiring pupils of all ages and grades with a love of study, and with pride and emulation in their work. He is a self-made man, in the strictest sense of the term, and possesses every good quality for a good superintendent. He has fully prepared himself for teaching as a profession, and expects to make it a life work. In his powers of analysis and explanation, he is surpassed by no one; making the most difficult problems, plain to the comprehension of his pupils. He will at all times do all in his power to elevate the teacher, calling to its true position among the liberal and respectable professions of the world.
