**What the Legislature did for the People.**

*My Dear Friends:*—You have heard all the deeds that the legislature did against you during the sessions of '91 and '93, now I will tell you what it did for you. The legislature of 1893 gave you free schools, or, as I would say, pretended free schools. Prior to 1893 we did not have a system of free schools in Pennsylvania. Why do I say that? As I said before, we pretended to have free schools. We built school houses, we furnished the teachers,

we did not give them free text books. Free schools are not free that deny to the poor man of this commonwealth every essential to the proper education of his children. Let me illustrate: There are people in this State, many of them, who do not earn more than fifty cents a day. There are many of them in the mountain districts of this State who do not have employment one half of the year. There are many of them who have as many as six children to send to the public schools. No man knows better than I what the cost of school books is, and no man can furnish six children with necessary books in the public school at less cost than eighteen dollars a year. To the man who works for fifty cents a day it means thirty-six days' hard labor to buy books for his children in the public schools. Think of it, eighteen dollars a year to a man who owns not his own home: it is an enormous tax. The session of 1893 brought, by the Free Book Bill, greater relief than any measure that was ever passed by previous legislatures, except the session of 1891 which gave another great relief by jumping from \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000 for the support of the public schools. Then again, in 1893, in addition to the free text books, we increased the appropriation to \$5,000,000. Now pray tell me, what great things did the previous legislatures do for the relief of the people? I wish you to understand there is not much solicitude on this subject among the rich, because the children of the rich are not patrons of the public schools. It does away with the practice of the boy learning his alphabet from a book which is practically furnished him because of the poverty of his parents. The reason I am interested in this piece of legislation is because I am interested in school matters. The best portion of my life was spent as a teacher, and I know something of the grievance whereof I complain, and the utility and value of this bill. There are people in this State who, after text books shall have been furnished to their children free, will still not be able to send them to school because of not being able to properly clothe them in these good old democratic times. Remember, this was a republican measure, pure and simple, and passed by a republican legislature,

therefore you will see that the republicans are also friends of the children of the State as well as of the soldiers, their widows and orphans. Every promise we make we fulfill. In next issue we will tell other good deeds we did. E. W. TOOLE.
