Dollars Made of Wheat.

A new solution of the silver question has been offered by Thomas A. Edison. In an interview he said: "The hankering after gold and silver is largely traditional. People allow themselves to be governed by the old ideas on the subject of coinage, formulated at a time when national credits existed and currency would be only taken at an intrinsic value. What we need is a new standard of value. "I think the best dollar could be made out of compressed wheat. You take a bushel of wheat and squeeze the water out of it and then compress it into a hard cake the size of a silver dollar and stamp the Government mark upon it. That would represent actual value and labor performed. Then you could cut a dollar, for when you wanted to use the wheat all that would be necessary would be to put your money to soak. We should then have the bushel of wheat as a permanent unit of value, which all farmers would appreciate, and the currency of the country would represent actual worth and labor performed. Both gold and silver could then be dispensed with. Our currency, moreover, would be as good as gold or silver in foreign exchange, for our wheat goes to all the countries of the world.
