Sheep as Heavy as Some Swine, and Swine as Heavy as Some Horses - Shetland Ponies - Dairy Machinery and Methods-Food Display From Land and Sea.

The agricultural exhibit of the World's Fair, including the stock pavilions, the great display amphitheater and the main building, covers a total of sixty-nine acres, over twice the entire acreage of the huge Manufactures
Building. It is at this pole of the Fair, says
the San Francisco Chronicle, that the farming interest is magnetized, while the artistic
spirit is attracted to the opposite pole, over a

For the most part the ex-hibits in the main hall ring the changes on pyramids of glass jars containing samples of grain, vegetables, fruits and other products of the soil in a profusion which can only retain its interest to the scientific farmer. 

Still other separate shows are made of this poultry, dogs and per stock.




