On To Duty.

Nelson's stirring appeal to his men just before the battle of Trafalgar may be too startling to introduce this brief call to Republicans.

But if Englishmen had to be reminded that every man was expected to do his duty on that day when England's liberties were in the balance, it may not be impertinent to send forth this clarion call: "Every Republican is expected to do his duty on the 7th day of November next."

Our government derives its powers from the consent of the governed. All policies directing the administration of the government are alike dependent upon the consent of those governed, and every man owes it to himself and to his country to exercise the sovereign right with which the constitution vests him as a citizen and as a freeman.

The ballot is mightier than the glittering bayonet, the thunderous roar of cannon, or the deathly forces of dynamite.

The perpetuity of our institutions, the "glorious heritage of our fathers," depends upon the intelligent exercise of the right of suffrage, and no man has a just right to lament his country's misrule who neglects to aid in directing its rule.

Every voter, then, should not neglect to cast his ballot and properly too: so that it will be counted for the men and policies that he intends to support.

The Republicans are again to measure strength with the party whose virtues—if, indeed, it has any—are confined chiefly to pledges which are seldom fulfilled. It is not my purpose to enter upon a discussion of the principles and policies of the different parties. The exhibition of statesmanship by the party in power of the general government is of a character that will not call forth enthusiastic applause of citizens who believe in applying business principles and methods to the management of legislative questions. We do not believe in the tyranny of a majority but we believe in a majority rule and the spectacle of the big Sycamore of the West covered by a howling minority is very picturesque, at least.

The Republican party presents two gallant, intelligent and patriotic citizens to be voted for as Judge of the Supreme Court and State Treasurer. They were unanimously called to contest for these high and responsible positions and the Republicans of Snyder county should give them an enthusiastic, unanimous support.

Let us show the opposition what can be done when men are in earnest.

The men chosen for the various county offices are all representative men. They represent the intelligence, integrity, muscle and sinew of the toilers of this county and every one of them is qualified to discharge the duties of the office for which he has been selected. There

should be no stay-at-homes next Tuesday. Every Republican who feels that the principles and policies of his party are promotive of good government should leave his workshop long enough to go to the polls and cast his ballot for the entire Republican ticket. Let us make a united determined effort to snow the opposition under with 1000 majority, and if every Republican does his duty it can be done.

Then And Now.

The Republicans of Snyder county and everywhere else for that matter may, in view of the near approach of the election, do well to remember this—that on the 4th of March last the country was in a prosperous condition. Farm and manufactured products brought good prices, labor was in demand and wages good, trade and industry flourished, money was abundant and found ready investment in the various pursuits of life. On that day not only a Democratic President was inaugurated, but a Democratic Congress—in the Senate and House of Representatives—came into power. Within sixty days from that time a panic ensued, currency became scarce and commanded a premium, trade was paralyzed, manufactories closed, banks failed, workmen were thrown out of employment, wages declined, demand for products of all kind ceased and shorter hours and fewer days' work for the toilers in the mills, in the stores, in the workshop and on the farm was a daily occurrence. With the decline in demand for manufactured articles came a decline in the quantity of these products, and a consequent decline in the need for employment of the workman and a necessary decline in wages. At that time the National Treasury was filled to overflowing. Now there is an admitted deficit and shortage of fifty millions of dollars. The Democratic voter may also bear in mind these indisputable facts. Let him ask himself whether this is not the plain truth. He need not inquire into the causes. He knows the fact. If he wants the causes he can readily find them in Democratic hostility to our industries, in the distrust of the Democratic policy, and in the demonstrated incapacity of the Democratic party to govern the country. Therefore it is that we earnestly urge every voter of whatever party affiliation to cast his ballot in favor of principles and for the party and ticket in order that our country may follow misery, abundance take the place of distress, and this land of ours, so abounding in all the resources of greatness and wealth, may be restored to its former flourishing and prosperous condition.

From all parts of Snyder county comes cheering news concerning the Republican ticket. It will receive the support of every party man, and the workers are earnestly putting forth their best efforts to get out the vote in November. The candidates have all paid personal visits to the various sections of the county, the people have seen them, sized them up and believe that the best interests of the county will be subserved by placing them in the hands of these gentlemen.

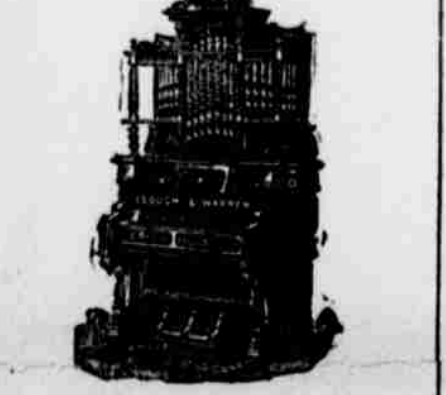
