Another of Leshers Mistakes.

An old adage says, "Misery loves company." The truthfulness of this time honored saying is exemplified in last week's issue of the Selinsgrove Times under an article headed "Where the fault lies" in which Leshers, the "Star" of the Snyder county Democracy, tries to wriggle himself out of the "hole" into which he has gotten by his own stupidity, by attempting to throw the blame of not having the candidates for the office of Associate Judge certified to the State Department, upon the Commissioners Clerk. For Mr. Leshers express edification and information I will here state that two months before the election I wrote to the State Department asking them what nominations, if any, should be filed with them from the Commissioner's office. The reply I received was none. As the Associate Judge draws his salary from the State Department, he is evidently a state officer. This fact is further confirmed by the fact that he receives his commission from the Department of State. Certainly, there his nomination should be certified to the same Department. The State Department has in plain English said that the certificate of his nomination shall not come from the County Commissioners. Where then is it to come from? There is only one other place from which it could come, viz: From the County Chairman. This view is corroborated by the legal opinions of Judges Gilkeson and Furst.

In view of these facts and opinions, Mr. Leshers must admit that it was through his own blind ignorance that the name of R. C. Fiss did not appear on the official list of nominations, sent to this office for the election.

I saw that for the above mentioned official list, it was not my business to state Mr. Leshers "dear little political boat" clear of the maelstrom of public criticism.

I am employed by the Commissioners and not as Mr. Leshers private secretary.

He further says that "all names must be printed on the ticket, unless objections are filed in writing 18 days before the election." This is true of properly filed county nominations. But in State nominations, of which the nominee for Associate Judge is one, the legal time for filing objections is 21 days.

Mr. Leshers further states that "the Commissioner's Clerk should have seen this, for the law is plain." I admit that the law is plain, and the Commissioner's Clerk did see it, and is willing to have his acts passed upon by any twelve men in Snyder county, whose minds are unprejudiced. But this clause in the Ballot Law was evidently not plain enough for Mr. Leshers undeveloped mind to grasp, or he would have sent the nomination of R. C. Fiss to the State Department according to Section 5 of the Revised Ballot Law of 1893.

Should Mr. Leshers still be of the opinion that the fault lies with the Commissioners Clerk, I would advise him to make information against the Commissioner's Clerk, according to Section 33 Revised Ballot Law of 1893, and then we will see who will have to undergo one year's imprisonment or pay \$1000 Mr. Leshers or the Commissioner's Clerk.

Mr. Leshers should be thankful to the Commissioner's Clerk for helping to keep him out of a "hole" into which he was liable to fall, by not having his county nominations filed according to law, for had not the afore mentioned Clerk written to him two days before the last day for filing county nominations, telling him that in two more days the time for filing said county nominations would expire, the probabilities are that the Democratic party would have had no ticket to vote on Nov. 7. In place of thanks for this act of kindness, Mr. Leshers tries to pull the Commissioner's Clerk into the "hole" with him. But this is not to be wondered at, as one of the most prominent traits of his character,

during his whole life has been "to curse the hand that blessed him." I hope that in the future Mr. Leshers may remember the old proverb, "think before you act and look before you leap."

I have no desire to enter into a controversy with the editor of the Times, my only object being to show the voters "where the fault does lie."

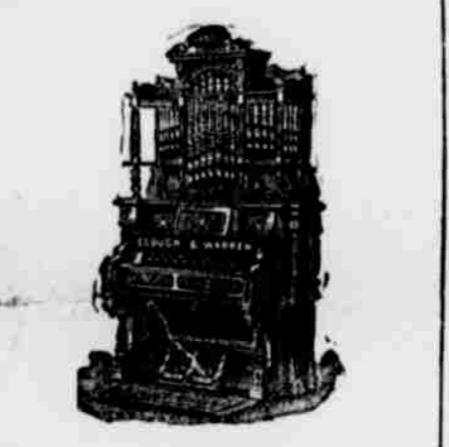
