WORLD'S FAIR TROPHIES.

The McCormick Harvesting Machine Company Awarded Seven Medals and Diplomas for the Superior Excellence of Their Binders and Mowers.

At the World's Columbian Exposition seven medals and seven diplomas were awarded the McCormick Harvesting Machine Company of this city. These honors are in recognition of the merit of the following named machines manufactured by the McCormick Company. The Machine of Steel, Bindochine, Open Elevator, McCormick Simple Knower, No 4 Steel Mower, Big 4 Steel Mower and the Corn Harvester. These, the highest awards, are based on the performance of the McCormick machines before the Judges in the field, at the regular field trials of the Exposition, held at Wayne, Ill., in July last, the machines tested being those regularly built for the general trade. It is a significant fact that of all the manufacturers of harvesting machinery having exhibits at the World's Fair, the McCormick Company alone complied with the committee's request to show the capabilities of their machines in the field. The first successful reaper was invented by Cyrus Hall McCormick in 1831, and from that time to this the McCormick machines have had a decided prestige over all others.
