THE SILVER PURCHASE.

Under the Sherman Act 168.674,590 Ounces Have Been Bought and \$36,-087,285 Coined.

Director Preston of the mint has prepared for Secretary Carlisle a statement showing the amount and cost of the silver purchased under the Sherman law, the following ex tract from which he furnished the presi dent: 'The amount and cost of silver pur chased under the act of July 14, 1890, from the date the act went into effect, August 31, 1890, to date of the repeal, November 2, 1893, was 168,674,580 fine ounces, costing \$155-930 940, the average cost per ounce being \$0.9244. The present market price is about 70 cents per ounce."

It is certain that of the purchase \$36,087.

It is certain that of the purchase \$36,087,-285 worth was coined into standard silver dollars leaving 140,089,700 ounces on hand. This amount will coin \$181,915,000. It has not yet finally been determined whether to authorize the coinage of the bullion, but in anticipation of any possible order the mints have been authorized to prepare the ingots and blanks from which the dollars are made. so as to proceed with the coinage promptly should notice to that effect be given.




