Human Sacrifices in Russia.

A Siberian paper gives the following account of the human sacrifices, which are still practised in remote parts of Russis, and which the orthodox church and the Government have long tried to suppress in vain. The victims of these sacrifices are always voluntarypeople who for old age, or ill-health, or poverty, or some other reason, are tired of life and resolve to quit it. The Tchuktchi who has made up his mind to die immediately notifies his neighbors and nearest relatives. The news spreads in the circle of his friends, and all of them soon visit the unhappy person to influence him to change his mind. Prayers, reproaches, complaints and tears have no effect on the fanatic, who explains his reasons, speaks of the future life, of the dead who appear to him in his sleep, and even when he is awake, calling him to them. His friends, seeing him thus resolved, go away to make the customary preparations. At the end of from ten to fifteen days they return to the hut of the Tchuktchi, with white mortuary garments and some weapone hu. 'the reindeer. After making his toile: the Tchuktchi withdraws into the corner of the hut. His nearest relative stands by his side, holding in [his hand the instrument of sacrifice, a the time.
