It does tickle our risibles to hear our Democratic contemporaries quote Republican authorities who assume the powers to vindicate the Democratic party from being the cause of the present hard times. Granting, for argument sake, that they are not responsible for the present depression, this Democratic wriggling is nothing less than an apology—and apology means retreat.

Hastings is the Man.

Only the strongest kind of opposition from the country delegates to the May convention, when a gubernatorial candidate is to be named, can prevent the nomination of General Daniel H. Hastings, an honor which he barely lost four years ago.
