GALUSHA A. GROW.

The Pennsylvania Republican and Protective Tariff Candidate for Congress-man-at-Large.



Galusha Aaron Grow, for whom you will vote next Tuesday, has been recognized for years as one of the ablest Republican leaders in the country.

Mr. Grow's maiden speech in Congress was on the Homestead bill, which he urged on every opportunity until its passage, in 1861.

In 1869 Mr. Grow's election to the United States Senate was strongly urged, but other counsels prevailed.

Mr. Grow always had the reputation of being a man of high character and high ability.

He was born in Ashford, Windham county, Connecticut, August 31, 1832.

He entered Amherst College, graduating in 1854 at the age of 22.

He was admitted to the bar in 1847, settling at Towanda, Pa.

His law partner was David Wilmot, of "Wilmot Provision" fame.

At this period of his life Mr. Grow's health was not robust, and an outdoor life was necessary for his recovery.

He therefore employed himself in surveying the mountain wild land of Northern Pennsylvania and in rafting on the Susquehanna.

He had a ready gift of speech and other qualities that soon made him conspicuous and gave him prominence in politics.

When the Thirty-seventh Congress met on July 4, 1861, 23 States were represented in the Senate and 22 in the House.

Henry Wilson, in his work, "The Rise and Fall of the Slave Power in America," thus alludes to Mr. Grow's election to the Speakership:

"The successor of David Wilmot, he adhered with inflexible fidelity to the principle embodied in the celebrated proviso of his predecessor.

As Chairman of the Committee on Territories in the Thirty-sixth Congress he had supported with marked ability the cause of freedom in struggling Kansas.

In his remarks, on taking the chair, he denounced the rebellion as the most causeless in the history of the race—a conspiracy nurtured in secret councils for the destruction of the Constitution and the Union.

He declared, amid vociferous shouts of applause on the floor and in the galleries, that "no flag alien to the sources of the Mississippi river will float permanently over its mouth, until its waters are crimsoned in human gore, and not one foot of American soil can ever be wrenched from the jurisdiction of the Constitution until it is baptized in fire and blood."

He reminded the House that a Government which could not command the loyalty of its own citizens and would not protect its loyal citizens "deserves the contempt of the world."

He summoned the House to act for the greatness and glory of the Republic. Mr. Grow received 90 votes in 1871, the whole number cast.

Mr. Grow's maiden speech in Congress was on the Homestead bill, which he urged on every opportunity until its passage, in 1861.

Nearly a half million farms, occupied by about 3,000,000 persons, have by this wise act been given to "honest settlers and not to land grabbers.

It is an area covering more territory than all of New England, and nearly as much as the entire acreage of the States of New York and Pennsylvania, and it now represents, roughly estimated, the astonishing value of \$10,000,000,000.

In 1869 Mr. Grow's election to the United States Senate was strongly urged, but other counsels prevailed.

He was a candidate for Governor in 1878, but failed to receive the nomination.
