His father was a day laborer on the Pennsylania Canal at the munificent wage of 50 cents a day when the subject of our sketch was born. The boy's inheritance consisted of his father's poverty and his magnificent physical manhood. At the early age of twelve we find him at the plow-studying English grammar as he turned the furrows. When the rebellion broke out two of his brothers enlisted and started for the front. Young Hastings, realizing that the "path of duty is the way to glory," for the first time rebelled against the wishes of his father and ran off. . wr-

ting as far as Carlisle and enlisting, his stern father found him enjoying the glory of the uniform of a full private and promptly returned him to the plow. When fourteen years old he heard of a school teacher's position which had become vacant twenty miles away, and he trudged off through the snow to try his chances for the position. He secured the position, but, finding that he had to stand an examination, he pluckily walked back-stood it and returned with the proper papers and taught the school.

In 1867 he was elected Principal of the Bellefonte High School, where he connected himself with the Bellefonte Republican as associate editor, and his pungent editorials still ring in the ears of the writer who was then, though still a boy, a constant reader of the Republican. Although principal of a high school and a voluminous writer he still found time to study law, and in 1877 was admitted to the bar where he soon distinguished himself and stood first among the noted lawyers then practicing at the Centre county bar. He also soon became a leader in politics and stepped from one place of distinction to another until his oratory and level-headedness had won for him a national reputation, and in 1877 he accepted the position of Adjutant-General of Pennsylvania.

In 1890 he was defeated for the nomination for Governor of this State by Senator Delamater, but inaugurated the campaign by making a speech for his successful rival within half an hour after his defeat and remained on the stump continually for nearly three month in behalf of the nominee.
