Twenty seven plotters will be put to death.

THE NEW CHINESE TREATY.

China Will Prohibit the Emigration of Laborers to This Country.

Following is the treaty that Secretary Gresham has concluded with China.

By article 1 China agree to prohibit emigration of laborers to the United St. tes. Article 2 relates to the return of registered laborers who may have gone back to China, leaving in this country property of the value of \$1,000 or more; it applies also

the value of \$1,000 or more, it applies also to the lawful wives and children of such registered Chinese. Article 3 specifies the right of Chinese officials, teachers, students, etc., coming to and residing in the United States.

Article 4 guarantees on the part of the United States the safety of the persons and property of Chinese residing in this coun-

By article 5 the United States recognizes the right of the Chinese government to en-force in case of American laborers residing in China, regulations similar to those made applicable to Chinese laborers in the United States.

Secretary Gresham is negotiating for a new commercial treaty with China, which if consumated will greatly increase American trade in that empire.

The expense of conveying the soil in barrels such a long distance would prevent any but comparatively wealthy people from trying the experiment, but my friends had made it a hobby. The only other case of earth-importing that I have met with is that done by the Shah of Persia. The traditions of his country prevent his treading on foreign soil, and when he makes a trip in foreign nations his attendants carry a supply of Persian soil, some of which is placed in his shoes, a practice which accounts for the great inconvenience walking always appears to his Majesty when abroad."-St. Louis Glote-Democrat.
