Discard Bangs.

A New York exchange says that a physician there advises mothers to discard bangs, even for their smallest daughters, these very little girls being the only ones whom fashion, at the moment, permits to wear them. There are, it seems, sensitive nerves about the eyebrows which are weakened when the hair is long enough to rest upon them.

These nerves directly concern the sight, and that important function is more or less tampered with by this constant though slight weight of hair. And another physician inveighs against another practice, which has never been regarded as having any especially serious effects-that of having night lights in children's bedrooms. Instead of allowing the optic nerves the perfect rest afforded of the Summit Hotel three miles by darkness the light keeps them in perpetual stimulation, with the result of causing the brain and the rest of the nervous system to suffer.




