Should There be Somebody to Look After County Bridges?

If there was some one to regularly visit and inspect all the bridges in the county it would save much money. Often the prompt repair of slightly damaged masonry or the cleaning of the channel or some slight little attention would save a much larger sum later. Almost everybody can recall instances coming under their own observation where if some one had promptly reported a damaged bridge it could have been repaired and prevented its being swept away by a subsequent flood.

If the county had a Bridge Commissioner he would save his salary many times over in this way in the course of a year, if he were faithful in attending to his duties.

Would it not be well if we had some such office? The County Commissioners are now kept very busy looking after the business of the county that is laid upon them. They respond to all calls to visit damaged bridges and repair them promptly; but nine times out of ten nobody calls attention to it until the bridges become impassable or damaged.

Discard Bangs.

A New York exchange says that a physician there advises mothers to discard bangs, even for their smallest daughters, these very little girls being the only ones whom fashion, at the moment, permits to wear them. There are, it seems, sensitive nerves about the eyebrows which are weakened when the hair is long enough to rest upon them.

These nerves directly concern the sight, and that important function is more or less tampered with by this constant thought weight of hair. And another physician inveighs against another practice, which has never been regarded as having any especially serious effects—that of having night lights in children's bedrooms. Instead of allowing the optic nerves the perfect rest afforded by darkness the light keeps them in perpetual stimulation, with the result of causing the brain and the rest of the nervous system to suffer.
