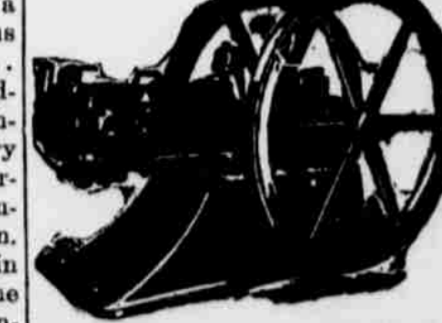
Court Proclamation.
