## The Paris Morgue and Its Dead.

Here are some grim figures from he annual statistical report of the Morgue. Last year no less than 909 bodies lay on the marble slabs of the Paris dead-house, and of this great pumber more than 200 were unknown men and women, claimed and recog-nized by none. Two hundred and ffteen out of the total number had lost their lives by drowning; falls had disposed of eighty-three; hanging ended seventy six, and firearms sixty-eight, while sufficiation, stabinz, and poisening brought most of the rest to heir death. The greater number of the corpses were those of men, and the statistics go to prove what has been already proved-that those who commit suicide oftener choose the ummer than the winter for their "rash act." It is strange, but true, that the brighter and more unhappy ouls find strength and nerve to end their miseries. As to what percentage of the Morgue subjects are sui-cides, of course no man can tell: but probably it is very high .--- Black and White.

THE STRIKE NOT SETTLED. A SPLIT AFTER MUCH TALK.

Liners and Operators Fail to End the Big Strike

The national convention of bituminous roal miners and operators called at Cleveland, Ohio, to attempt a settlement of the miners' strike ended Thursday. There was not a sufficient number of operators represented in the convention to make any settle-

sented in the convention to make any settle-ment general, and the miners, in parsuance of the policy unpped out at their national convention in Columbus, refused to make a settlement and the strike will continue. The following resolutions adopted by the miners' delegates in caucus and read in the convention tells what was done, and shows that there is no bluff about the miners' posi-tion caucher all focus to maked be

that there is no bluff about the miners' posi-tion, ope for all, all for one, by which they will triumph or perish: Whereas, In view of the fast that a large proportion of the coal operators of the bitaminous mines have either contemptuous-ity or otherwise ignored the hand of peace and conciliation profered to them in the call-ing of this convention, and. Whereas, Being guided by the light of ex-perience, we believe that, in the absence of those operators, any settlement, based on a compromise, would be utterly impractizable, and would only add to and seconduct the miserable condition of our constituents,

miserable condition of our constituents, therefore he it

Resolved, That we doem it impossible to make any settlement here with those opera tors who have met us, and, while appreciating the full extent of the effort made by the same we ask their co-operation in bringing peaceable and persuasive pressure to bear upon the absent operators to agree to terms giving justice to our craftsmen.

The miners at their convention and Exce utive Board meeting Friday decided to wait on the action of the operators. If there is another national meeting it must come from the operators, and the attendants must include representatives of the fields that stood in the way of a settlement. Had they been here the miners would have accepted a compro-mise rather than no settlement. That much mise rather than no settlement. That much was said in convention by thenational officers of the United Mine Workers, but they will suffer defeat in preference to making terms with only a portion of the operators. The miners are determined on this point, and at Tuesday's session of the Executive Board, as-signed near to the various fields to manage the strike until the mersion is board for manage the strike until the operators are heard from to meet in convention again.

The West Virginia and Southern and Cen-The West Virzinia and Southern and Cen-tral lilinois and Central Pennsylvaria fields are the objective points now. Fittsburg, the battle ground at the beginning, is less im-portant new than the points named. If the operators in these fields do not join in the negotiations for settlement, the strike will begoin a context of physical forces. become a contest of physical force.
