Although Mr. Lyon is a personal friend of Senator Quay, he has at various times chosen independent ground in the Republican politics of the State. He is thoroughly imbued with the idea that the Republican party is one of progress, He has filled all public positions to which he has been chosen with the most scrupulous integrity and faithfulness. Early in life, while studying for the law, Mr. Lyon was a publie school teacher. He is of a quiet and scholarly disposition, and spends most of his leisure hours at a modest home in Allegheny. He is the possesor of a fine family, and takes considerable pleasure in the company of his children and books,


