IT IS A WAITING SEASON.

An Outlook Which Had Begun to Seem Brighter is Clouded.

R. G. Dun & Co's, New York "Weekly Review of Trade" says: Storms and floods, prolonged strikes and large exports of gold have done their utmost this wiek to give business a vacation, but the wants unsatisfled during the past year, belated and much lessened, and yet greater than those of any other nation, have caused a volume of trade quite large for the season. The strikes do not appear near an end, and ranged traffic brokers, of London and Liverpool, have failed, with liabilities estimated at £112,582.
