

School Appropriations.

We have secured for the benefit of our readers a complete list of the state appropriations to the various school districts of Snyder County.

The state school appropriation this year of \$5,500,000 is an even half million dollars greater than it ever has been, and the warrants now in process of distribution to the 2,386 districts in the sixty-seven counties will provide means to improvement in education, lengthening of the school term and increase in facilities of the most valuable and far-reaching character.

We place below the list of appropriations for 1893 and 1894 to show how much more the state is paying our school districts in comparison to last year. The county will receive \$3,832.87 more this year than last year. The list of appropriations follows:

From the 1893 report, we note that Monroe and Washington pay the best salaries. Monroe employs eight teachers and Washington twelve. Note the difference in the appropriations. All the districts are receiving more money and school officers should take advantage of the state's generosity.

On Saturday the Indian Forts Commission met at Sunbury. It consists of the following persons appointed by the Governor: Jay G. Weiser, of Middleburg; John M. Buckalew, of Fishing Creek, Columbia Co.; G. Dallas Albert, Latrobe; Sheldon Reynolds, of Wilkes Barre; and H. M. M. Richards, of Reading, Pa.

The commission located Fort Augusta above Sunbury and considered it the most important East of the Alleghenies. Mr. Weiser expects to locate thirty forts in his district, Mr. Buckalew fifteen, Mr. Albert thirty, Mr. Reynolds ten and Mr. Richards twenty-five, making about one hundred and ten forts in the state.

A short time ago a tramp became sick at Lewistown with a mild attack of small pox and the board of health isolated the case and hired another tramp to take care of him. As a matter of course, no one went to see how he was getting along and according to tramp No. 2 in a few days No. 1 died.
