The probabilities are that the appointment will be made in a few days. No Pennsylvania postmasters have been appointed for a week or ten days and the next batch will likely come soon. A new feature has developed in the fact that Judge Bucher has pulled off his coat for L. R. Hummel. Just why this combination has been made is not fully understood, but time may tell the tale.

Our congressional district has been ably represented for the last two years by Hon, Thad, Mahon, The Snyder County Republican Standing Committee, in its wisdom, saw fit to instruct its conferees to vote for Mr. Mahon. 


