### The Selinsgrove Post-Office Fight.

The contest for the position of Postmaster at Selinsgrove is waxing warm. The commission of Dr. B. F. W. Threller has expired, but as he is unable to take charge of the office until the 1st of July, he will probably be permitted to serve four full years which will close next Wednesday. Rumors were afloat on Monday that Miles Wetzel was appointed, but the report is evidently incorrect. Jos. G. Lesher still claims to have a "pull" with the state committee, but those who profess to know claim that since the Democratic County Convention he has lost his grip on the state committee and the Selinsgrove post-office. The general opinion now prevails that L. R. Hummel has the inside track and is driving a double team in order to outdo his competitors. The friends of H. F. Oakes and S. Thompson Hibbish are still hoping that something may turn up to drop the plumb their way. Roscoe C. North has withdrawn from the race. The probabilities are that the appointment will be made in a few days. No Pennsylvania postmasters have been appointed for a week or ten days and the next batch will likely come soon. A new feature has developed in the fact that Judge Bucher has pulled off his coat for L. R. Hummel. Just why this combination has been made is not fully understood, but time may tell the tale.

Hon. Thad. Mahon.

Our congressional district has been ably represented for the last two years by Hon. Thad. Mahon. The Snyder County Republican Standing Committee, in its wisdom, saw fit to instruct its conferees to vote for Mr. Mahon. Our representative by his sterling qualities, his brilliant intellect and his unyielding devotion to principles of good government, won for him a great deal of prestige among the legislative lights of the lower house. Hence it is but a fitting tribute to his meritorious service to receive the unanimous support of the Republicans in political science and political economy are far in advance of the average student of economics.

The great question of the day, "The Social Problem," has been neither neglected nor ignored. He is an advocate of good government and sound political measures. His dignified mien and calm considerate judgment carry with him the respect and deference due to a member of the National Congress.

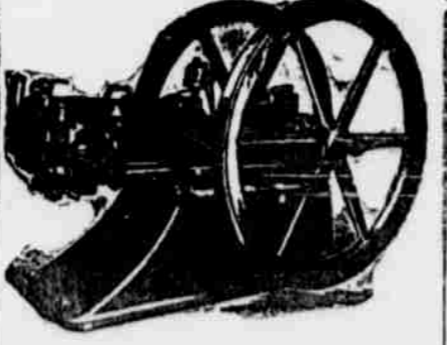
