NOTICE TO HEIRS.

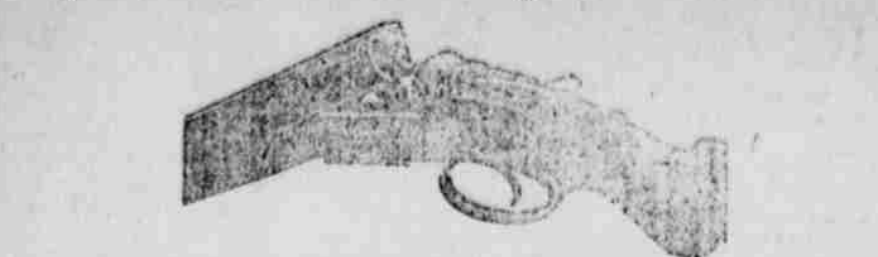
