Perry Twp., at Fremont, Aug. 22. West Perry Twp., at Cross Roads S. H., Aug. 24. Reynolds Twp., at Cherry Hill S. H., Aug. 25. Jackson Twp., at Kratzerville, Aug. 27. The examinations will begin at 8:30 o'clock A. M. Persons under 17 years of age will not be examined.

Private examinations will be given only in accordance with the school laws. Applicants must be examined in the district in which they intend to teach. Teachers who have passed last year should have made notable improvement. It is expected that directors will attend the examination that they may see and hear the work of the applicants for their respective schools can do. All teachers should be selected on merit and certificates should not only be given to the grade of certificate but to clearness, business qualifications, industry, and natural aptitude of the applicant.
