It is a common thing for white people to ridicule the colored race, and it is true, they do some things that are laughable, but white people do the same. Persons who are intellectually smart find no pleasure in making sport of others whom they consider beneath themselves in position and color. In a christian sense we recognize the negro as our kin, because his Father is our Father, and when we see a gaping crowd surrounding them, for the mere purpose of picking up something to sneer about, the cord of sympathy within us is touched. When a colored minister is preaching in a respectable place we do not deem it improper for respectable people to go, see and hear, and when a bush-meeting is in progress where some praise God and others play "bingo," all such who don't admire that kind of procedure, have the world-wide opportunity of staying away. TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS FOR 1894.

Examinations for teachers' certificates will be held in the several districts of Snyder County as follows: Beaver twp., at Beavertown, Aug. 19. West Beaver twp., at McClure, Aug. 19. Spring twp., at Adamsburg, Aug. 19. Adams twp., at Troxelville, Aug. 15. Centre twp., at Centreville, Aug. 16. Middleburgh & Franklin, at Middleburgh, Aug. 17. Monroe twp., at Shamokin Dam, Aug. 23. Union twp., at Port Trevorton, Aug. 21. Chapman twp., at Rohrer's S. H., Aug. 22. Perry twp., at Pennont, Aug. 22. West Perry twp., at Cross Roads S. H., Aug. 21. Kewdale (Ind.), Cherry Hill S. H., Aug. 25. Jackson twp., at Krazersville, Aug. 27. Penn twp., at Salem, Aug. 28. Middlecreek twp., at Smithgrove, Aug. 29. A general special examination will be held at my office Sept. 12. The examinations will begin at 8:30 o'clock A. M. Persons under 17 years of age will not be examined. Private examinations will be given only in accordance with the school laws. Applicants must be examined in the district in which they intend to teach. Teachers who barely passed last year should have made notable improvements. It is expected that directors will attend the examination that they may see and hear the work of the applicants for their respective schools can do. All teachers should be selected on merit and attend to their duties not only to the grade of certificate but to character, business qualifications, industry, and natural aptitude of the applicant. 
