## TWIRLED TO DEATH.

GEORGE DOBSON A PROMISING YOUNG MAN OF PAXTONVILLE. MEETS AN UNTIMELY END.

> Scarcely had the cloud of sadness and sorrow, which accompanied the finding of the body of the young suicide of this place, a week since, dispersed its shadows; than the community, on Tuesday afternoon, was again depressed by the intelligence of the sad, untimely death of George Dobson of Paxtonville, two miles west of this place. George was a quiet, well behaved, unassuming young man of about twenty-two summers. For the past few years he had worked at carpentering. Last spring he gained an apprenticeship in the grist-mill of Charles P. Swengle : and it was here, while in the faithful performance of his duties that he was forced to meet his death,

> George was alone in the mill when the accident happened. He was found shortly after three o'clock by some children who happened into the mill. The sad news was communicated to their parents, and a crowd promptly hastened to the spot. The surrounding circum-
