

An Old Snyder Countian Dies in a Canada Asylum.

John C. Hehn of Sandwich, Ontario, writes to the Post stating that his father Samuel Hehn died at the asylum in London, Ontario, after being there 18 years. He died on the 25th of July. Sandwich is an old historic town on the frontier opposite Detroit.

General Samuel Hehn formerly lived in Monroe township, Snyder county, and was a warm friend of our townsman, Hon. Jere Crouse. About 1857, he was General Commanding the Eleventh Division composed of Militia and Volunteers of Snyder county. He was a son of Capt. John Hehn who now lies buried in the Reformed graveyard at Selingsgrove. Capt. Harding and the General had a little trouble during an encampment at Fremont. Harding took Hehn's horse and assumed command without authority. Hehn looked himself in a room at the hotel. Capt. Harding and David Perry broke open the door, stole the General's sword and removed his epauletts. The humiliation of this unprovoked reduction to the ranks weighed so heavily upon his mind that General Hehn conceived the idea that he no longer had any friends in the United States. He then fled to Canada and nothing was heard from him until the news arrived of his death in the asylum a few weeks ago. The families represented above were among the early settlers of Snyder county.

The Lewisburg Chronicle thinks the reason Snyder county will have four or five candidates for State Senator is because they are building a \$12,500 bath room in connection with the Senate annex at Harrisburg. It remarks that political cherry picking in Snyder county is rather dirty work.

It appears as though the large number of candidates from Snyder county for State Senator is already alarming the wire-pullers of Union county. 


