Disgruntled Democracy.

Democratic party in Snyder County

THE DESTRUCTION of the devastation in the tracks of the Minnesota forest fires. It boasts of two chairmen and claims none. It rides on the waves of political destruction, a wind-worn vessel of despondency and despair. The distribution of political plums, which so seldom falls to their lot, has been a menace to party harmony and has created discord and confusion among the rank and file of a broken and shattered democracy. The despair and anguish of a once happy crew is depicted in living colors wherever they look for hope and consolation. The belligerent tendencies of still more warlike elements which were once passionately fond of the expression, "To the victor belong the spoils," are now bewailing their unfortunate lot. They are wondering whether the victor really gets the spoils.

If the National Democratic victory of 1892 had not come to give a hope for spoils the Democratic party in Snyder county would not have been any weaker than it always had been. Disappointment met disappointment in rapid succession until the fragments of democracy were buried in the sands of hopeless despondency. The Democrats need not worry, they can vote the Republican ticket.

White Lead as a Preservative.

The advantages of using genuine white lead for painting surfaces, especially iron work, have been known for years, but an instance mentioned by Sir William Arrol will serve to impress the fact on the memory. Some years ago he purchased the materials of old Hammersmith Bridge for the purpose of using a portion in erecting a temporary plant at one of his large undertakings. The iron work had been in position sixty-two years, and many of the parts, owing to inaccessibility, had not been painted since they were placed in position. Finding them in so remarkable a state of preservation Sir William Arrol had some of the paint analyzed, when it was found to be genuine white lead.

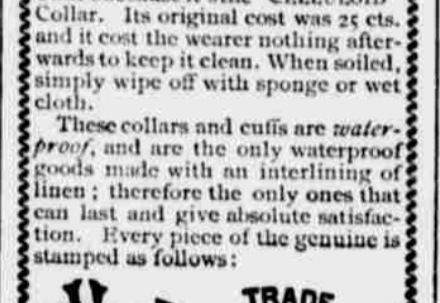
