## The Congressional Situation.

Now since both candidates have been named, the campaign is ready to be inaugurated. It will be Mahon versus Smith. We regret that Dr. D. G. Smith has allowed himself to become the target for so many missiles that surely will be hurled at the principles he has espoused. Mr. Mahon has been tried and has given universal satisfaction. The situation in congress must be changed, if prosperity shall again smile.

The President has declared that the tariff war must go on. Not content with the fact that after having kept the country in a state of depression and anxiety for a year, at the end of which they were compelled, by the state of business, to pass a bill whose only commendatory feature is the measure of protection it affords, and whose odious income tax and deferential duties in favor of the sugar trust no one defends. Not content with these things, they as a party demand a continuation of this struggle.

It certainly will be continued if the next Congress is Democratic. We are not calamity howlers but we feel and know that the only hope of that era of prosperity we all desire, lies in stopping the warfare on American industries. Hence we are for Mahon. Dr. D. G. Smith is not amenable for the sins of his party, but when he accepted the nomination, he endorsed the past record of his party in power and expressed his willingness to defend principles that are detrimental to American homes and American industries.

The mission of the Republican party is to put this country on a sound financial basis, to rescue the treasury from its present depleted condition, to so restore the confidence of the world that we may enter upon a prolonged period of prosperity and our factories and industries once more resound with the happy voices of thrifty people.
