G. Curtin. Therefore be it RESOLVED, The Regimental Association of the 49th P. V. hereby regrets the sorrowing demise of one who had always proved himself to be a true friend of the soldier, who in our country's direst hour stood shoulder to shoulder with our heroic martyr, Abraham Lincoln and by his wise counsel, quick action and fearless statesmanship contributed more to the maintenance of the Union than any other chief magistrate of any Commonwealth in the land.

On motion the report was adopted and agreed that the same be printed in the proceedings and a copy sent to the family. Adjourned for dinner.

Five photographs of the old 49th P. V. Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, are in possession of the comrade of the memorable "Bloody Angle," at Spottsylvania, where the regiment lay the whole day on May 31st, 1862, in the rear of the spot where the large tree was completely cut off by bullets, fired from the guns of our army, and which tree is now placed among the ruins of the rebellion, in one of the Government buildings at Washington City, D. C., and the members who have received these souvenirs will retain them as sacred mementoes of one of the most sanguinary engagements that perhaps ever occurred during their army life.
