### Teachers' Institute.

The teachers of Monroe township met in the High school room at Shamokin Dam, Friday evening, October 19, this being the first meeting of the eleventh annual session of the "Teachers Institute of Monroe township." The teachers, Messrs. Jarrett, Kessler, Kuhn, Klingler, Gaugler, Shafer, Bulic and Reichley were all present and took an active part in the proceedings. The subject, "Reading and how to teach it," was very ably discussed by the different teachers—and Superintendent Bowersox, who honored us with his presence and affable disposition. The subject, "Tardiness, and how to overcome it," was next commented upon by the different members, after which an organization was inaugurated to be known as the Monroe Teachers' Reading Society, which is to hold weekly meetings at the different school houses. These two societies, through their able local talent, and loyal support of our energetic County Superintendent, are destined to elevate the intellectual standard of our community to such an eminent degree, that it will be second to none in the state.

Edward R. Sponsler, a member of the Perry county bar, has been arrested on the charge of embezzlement and held in bail to answer at the November term of the Criminal Court. He is charged with converting to his own use money belonging to the Erie City Iron Company, of Erie. He is a son of William Sponsler late president of the wrecked Perry County Bank. This makes five members of the Perry County bar who will have to answer the charge of embezzlement.

The Lewisburg Journal of Wednesday says: Last Saturday evening there was a sensation on Water street. William Strickland got into a quarrel with his wife, or the woman he was cohabiting with as a wife. In the quarrel he drew a razor and attempted to cut her throat. She warded off the razor but was cut on the hand; then she fled to a neighbor's with the man and razor after her. On her information Strickland was arrested and served Sunday in jail. On Monday he was released on \$500 bail, G. A. Stahl being the security.

The question as to whether or not General Hastings, after his inauguration as Governor, will have the power to remove Recorder of Deeds Curley in Philadelphia who was recently appointed by Governor Pattison, and to appoint a republican in his place, has been discussed pretty thoroughly since the appointment was made and the Republican leaders say they have been advised by prominent members of the old bar that the Governor would have the necessary power. In support of this contention the Supreme Court decision in the case of Lane vs. the Commonwealth is quoted. David H. Lane was appointed recorder of Philadelphia by Governor Hoyt, but was removed by Governor Pattison on February 1st, 1883. He refused to vacate, and took the case to the Supreme Court, where an opinion was handed sustaining the action of the Governor.

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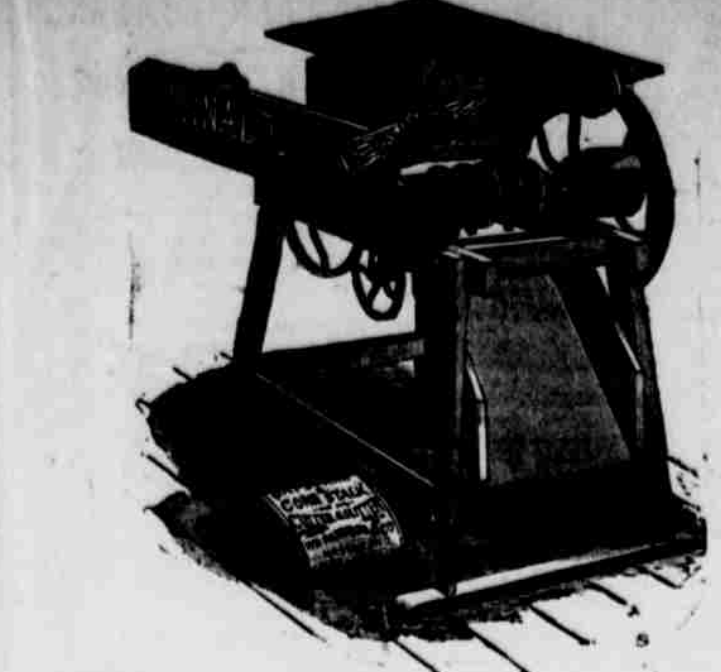
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
