

Road Improvement in Pennsylvania.  
The highway and improvement committee of the Pennsylvania division of the L. A. W. has established headquarters at Scranton and is getting down to work in a systematic and aggressive manner. A road has been prepared under the committee's direction and will be introduced into the Legislature at next session. It will be known as the public thoroughfare act and applies only to the boroughs and townships of that commonwealth. It proposes to classify public thoroughfares as follows: A—post roads, B—public roads that have been used as public post routes, C—roads parallel to rail roads now used as post routes providing such roads connect two or more offices and are not more than two miles apart and at present a public travel road. Class C is divided into two divisions; first, those public roads which lie wholly within any single borough or township, second, those which lie in two or more boroughs or townships and which lie on the line between two or more boroughs. In order to improve the roads placed in division C Class C improvements are necessary and are provided for as follows: The improvements to be made on such public thoroughfares will consist of the construction of permanent road-bed, well arched, feet wide, thoroughly underdrained with a covering of six inches of broken stone of at least two inches mesh, well protected at the ends by copings of stone wall or curb, with sufficient causeways of stone or earth, properly graded, to carry and divert water in the side ditches; provided broken stone need not be laid covering aforesaid in any portion of such thoroughfare where, in the nature of the soil, a firm suitable foundation can be secured without such covering."

A Curious Cave Found.  
Quite a curiosity was discovered on a farm in Patton township, this county the other day while laborers were clearing away rubbish on the top of a hill to get a field ready for planting. It was the entrance to a

curious cave is a great curiosity in any ways. There was a small opening which had become filled up with rubbish and dirt, which, after having been cleared out, was seen to be a three foot square, so that a person could crawl in on his hands and knees. The passage was about forty feet long and opened into a room about twenty feet square and nine feet high, having the appearance of having been cut by man hands. This must have been done while ago, as there was quite a number of most beautiful stalactite and agate formations of a calcareous nature. In several places in the floor there were large crevices, down which one could see and hear water running. From off this cavern room runs a passage, through which one has to crawl for quite a distance, which has not been thoroughly explored as yet, although it is thought that quite a lot of caverns are found when the cave is thoroughly explored.

The reason the cave is thought to have been cut out and these formations believed to have grown since this limestone country, where they grow rapidly, is the evidences of worn niches and rough-cut pieces and hieroglyphics. On the floor there were many instruments of stone and burnt clay that were in good condition. They looked like Indian articles and the place evidently been an Indian habitation some two hundred years ago. The owner expects to develop the cave in the near future to find out whether the passageway leads to any other discoveries of similar nature. The limestone growth having nearly filled it up.—Centre Reporter.
