Hackenburg's Bill.

Senator Hackenburg, of North-
umberland county, who believes that
the Judges of the courts of this
State should be relieved of the an-
noying duty of considering and dis-
posing of applications for licenses
to manufacture and sell vinous,
spirituous, malt and brewed liquors,
as in his possession a bill which
proposes the establishment of a
Senate court to consist of ten per-
sons and to be appointed by the
governor sixty days from the pas-
sage of the act. The introduction of
Senator Hackenburg's measure will
be contingent on the encouragement
received from his fellow members
of the Senate.

The bill virtually requires that
the members of the proposed court
shall be Republicans and five Demo-
crats. Two shall be appointed for
two years, two for four, two for six,
two for eight and two for ten years.

The appointments for each of
these terms both the great political
parties shall be recognized. On the
expiration of the term of any one of
these Judges his successor shall be
appointed for ten years, so that the
Judges shall be chosen every
second year. In the event of any
vacancy the Governor is directed
to fill it by the appointment of a per-
son of the same political faith to be
elected. No member of the court
who has served a full term of ten
years shall be eligible to reappoint-
