INDUSTRIAL SITUATION.

WORK AND WAGES.

Electricity Superceding Steam - Education and Labor.

The long and unceasing demands of the labor organizations of Pennsylvania for legislation on labor questions give promise of bearing fruit.

SUPERSEDING STEAM. It is certain that the steam railroads will in the near future be compelled to meet the new conditions created by the application of electricity to car propulsion.

ROLLING MILLS TO START UP. The rolling mills of the Juniata iron company, of Hollidaysburg, Pa., which have been shut down for the past six years have started up under the control of a company of Harrisburg capitalists.

A CO-OPERATIVE MINING COMPANY. A limited partnership, to be known as the Elizabeth mining company, and to run for four years, has been formed on the co-operative plan by Elizabeth, Pa., miners to operate the Horner & Roberts' mine.

CUTTING DOWN FORCE. Five hundred employees of the Union Pacific Railroad, mechanics and laborers in the shops between Cheyenne and Cheyenne, are being put on a reduced force.

PROPERTY OWNERS. The subject of the ownership of homes and property by the working classes is receiving the attention of labor organizations and individual workingmen throughout the country.

ONE OF THE GLASS WORKERS. The Beeckee Glass Works at Martin's Ferry, scored one of the strikers Wednesday night by smuggling in 30 men while the pickets were on duty.

AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT. The co-operative experiment of the American Flint Glass Workers' association will be watched with much interest.

The miners of the Marshall Coal Company, Pa., will go to work. Two hundred men are employed. At the time of the trouble over a week ago Mr. Marshall, who was paying the \$2.60 rate, ordered to keep the mines running and to pay whatever rate was made by up-the-river mines.

The long-standing differences in the ranks of the Knights of Labor now threaten a serious outbreak in the order.

The employees of the Homestead steel plant have formed a lodge of the Amalgamated Association, in spite of the opposition of the Carnegie company.

Australian Independence. Word from Australia is to the effect that the federation party is still abroad in the land.

Conviction and Suicide. The jury in the case of George E. St. John, a prominent real estate dealer, of Port Clinton, O., charged with frauds in dealing in canceled mortgages, brought in a verdict of guilty.

THE LEAKAGE OF GOLD.

Puts an Additional Dampener on the Spirits of Business Men.

H. G. Dun & Co. say: Events have not helped business this week. About \$1,350,000 gold has been withdrawn from the Treasury, mainly for export, and the gold reserve has been reduced to about \$55,000,000.

What was sold at the lowest point over known for the May option, and spot has declined 4 cents for the week.

Failures this week have been 363 in the United States, against 430 last year, and 59 in Canada, against 55 last year.

Prices of staple articles support a tendency toward improvement. There is a falling price of an advance, ten which are in the range of a week ago.

The Iron Trade. The Iron Trade Review says: The iron trade came down to the last week in January with little change in actual conditions since the opening of the year.

THE BROOKLYN STRIKE.

The opening of the Myrtle avenue line Wednesday was attended with more disorder than occurred at any other point.

A crowd of strikers gathered on Myrtle avenue during the day and refused to give an account of himself or get off the street.

The climax of a number of demonstrations and acts of violence in Brooklyn came in Hicks street, in the afternoon, when a multitude of strikers, led by James J. McLaughlin, drove a car that advanced through piers and showers of missiles, fired upon people who refused to obey the order to close their windows.

The tragedy aroused the people to renewed acts of violence, and a short time afterwards a man leaped from a window and fired a pistol point blank at Major Cochrane, the commander of the troops.

Tired of Walking Delegates. At a meeting of the Building Trades' council in St. Louis, a radical constitution was adopted. One of the most important changes made is the abolition of the office of walking delegates.

EARTHQUAKE AT KUCHAN.

ENTOMBED AT PRAYER.

Six Hundred People Perish in Various Baths.

A dispatch to the London Times from Kohoran gives further details of the destructive earthquake at Kuchan.

Most of the victims were crushed to death by falling buildings, but many were burned to death, the ruins in which they were entangled having caught fire.

The "Times" correspondent says it is pitiful to witness the terror-stricken people huddled in groups and exposed to the inclemency of the weather, which continues intensely cold.
