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

SPECULATION IS HOT.

Money is Diverted From Production to Gamble in Products.

R. G. Dun & Co's., New York, review of

In every speculative department business is growing, but this is really the least satisfactory feature of the situation. Cotton, cil and wheat climb above the export price, so that the marketing of products abroad must be checked, and money is above sed which ought to be employed in productive industry and in distribution of products to consumers. Everybody knows that oil has not risen 200 per cent because it is intrinsically more valu-able, nor is wheat actually worth more than it was two or three weeks ago, but the ex-pansive and uplifting force has unfortunately taken to speculation rather than to produc-tion and so we have higher prices in all spec-ulative markets without a larger demand for convemption.
Stories of combinations between the Stan-

Stories of combinations between the Standard Oil Company and Russia, as to partition of the oil consuming territory, by no means account for recent prices of petroleum, which appear to be entirely fictitious.

There is no evidence that cotton is in larger demand than it was when the price was a cent lower, but prices have been so low for months that an upward movement was easy

months that an upward movement was easy without much reason, though stocks here and abroad are 300,000 bales larger than they were at the same date after the greatest crop ever produced heretofore, and spinners here and abroad have taken about 1,600,000 bakes more than they have consumed. The rise tends to prevent the decrease of acreage,

which is its one reasonable excuse.

Wheat has advanced over 3 cents during the past week, and the western receipts are small, only 1,602,846 bushels, against 1,766,-829 last year, but Atlantic exports for three weeks of April, have been only 5,666,481 bushels, Hour included, against 5,650,566 fast year, and there is no indication that the foreign demand will increase, while the prospects for the year's crop are considered excellent. Western receipts are not large and it would be strange if they were, with prices so low but advancing. Exports continue to indicate that the European demand will not be particularly heavy this samend.

be particularly heavy this season.

Outside of speculative markets, the important feature is the rise in the price of beef, but which is largely due to the control of sources of supply by a few strong corperations. There ought to be, but apparently is not, sufficient power in the bands of the government to meet any such conspiracy against the public and the proposal of Secre-tary Morton to admit Mexican cattle and cattle from Canada on easy terms for the benefit of consumers is heartily commended, though it is not likely to have much in-fluence. The actual decrease in receipts of cattle at the four chief western markets has been 200,000 head during the first quarter of 1825, and the quantity killed has been only 80, 60 head less than last year, about 10 per cent, but facts have little to do with prices in

In iron and steel the situation is rather disappointing, although the output continues large, as the demand for finished products does not seem to increase. It is still an open question whether the consumption will support the manufacture at the present rate, which is at least an eighth be-low the present maximum. AN INDIAN BATTLE.

Conflict of Authority in the Chickasaw Nation.

Couriers from Tishomingo, the capital of the Chickasaw nation, report that a battle is raging between Governor Moseley and 200 insurrectionists. Six people have been killed and eight wounded and the greatest excitement prevails. The cause of the trouble is age to bad political blood, which has long prevailed the Chicausaw seat of government and has existed since the legislature ignored Willis Brown, Charles Brown and McGill, who claim to have been duly elected sheriffs of the nation, alleging that the legislature did not have authority to reject their

chaims to such offices.

On Tuesday morning Governor Moseley issued orders to all sheriffs, constables and desired. puties throughout the nation to report to sim at once with arms. When the officers him at once with arms. When the officers gathered around the nouse 200 enraged men. headed by McGill and the Brown brothers, rushed from adjoining houses, and a deady riot followed. The names of the dead and wounded could not be ascertained by the couriers, owing to the great excitement which

Governor Moseley and his official retinue escaped by rushing to houses on the outskirts of the towns Moseley has called a special session of the legislature to take action. Thenomingo is now in a terrible state of excitement, and white people are fleeling. Another fight is looked for at any moment

CROP CONDITIONS

Decided Improvement is the Rule, Where Rains are Needed.

The Weather Bareau, in its review of weather crop conditions for the week ended March 15, says: Heavy rains have caused serious damage in New England, where, as yet, only a little farm work has been done, and that in the southern portion. Heavy rains of the previous week delayed farm work in North Carolina until Thursday, Rain is badly North Carolina until Trursday, Rain is Cadly needed in North Dakota, Northern Minnesota, Oklahoma and Oregon, and would be of great benefit in Texas. Rains would also prove beneficial to Illinois, Louisiana and

Cotton planting has been delayed in Texas on account of dry weather; planting has be gun in North Carolina and Oklahoma and has continued to some extent in Arkan as, but has not yet became general in that State; in South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi planting is being pushed rapidly and in Louisiana about one-half of the crop has been planted.

Corn planting in the extreme Southern States is about completed; the early planted is up and a good stand is generally reported; planting is more than half completed in Tennessee, has begun in Kentucky and Nebraska and is being vigorously pushed in Kansas. The general outlook for fruit continues

very favorable,
Tobacco plants are looking well in Maryland, Virginia and Kentucky and planting is being pushed rapidly in South Carolina.
