

RUSSIA IS READY.

Her Fleets and Armies are Prepared for Emergencies in the East.

The Svies, St. Petersburg, declares that Russia has concentrated in Japanese waters 22 warships, carrying 360 gans and a large body of men. This fleet, it is added, with

body of men. This fleet, it is added, with the French squadron, chakes a total of 27 warships, carrying 610 guns. Moreover, according to the Sviet, a Russian army of 20,000 men could occupy Jesso and take Japan in flank should trouble arise.

A Yokohama telegram says: It is efficially denired that the Chinese customs, by the terms of the treaty of peace with Japan, are placed under Japanese control. The stipulation says that on the payment of the first two installments of the indemnity to be paid by China Wei Hai Wei might be evacanted, provided China pledges her customs revenue in order to insure the payment of the balance due. This, it is added, is optional and might never take effect. At present there is no intention of couching the customs revenue of China, much less placing it under the control China, much less placing it under the control

BRITISH TROOPS L ANDED.

Marines Take Possession of Corinto and

the Government Retaliates. Admiral Stephenson, commanding the British squadron, landed 300 marines at Corinto and took possession of the port to enforce the ultimatum requiring the payment force the ultimatum requiring the payment of £15,090 indemnity for the expusion of Consul Hatch. In reply to the ultimatum President Zelaya regretted that the Nicaruguan government was unable to comply with the demands of Great Britian, of the justice of which there could be no doubt, but he solemnly protests against the British occupancy of the port.

The Nicaraguan government at once retaliated by declaring Corinto a closed port, which means that no goods can be entered there and that the British will thus be pre-

which means that he goods can be entered there and that the British will thus be pre-vented from collecting the duties on imports, from which they expected to make up the indemity. Most of the people have left the town, and it is now practically desert-

ed.

The Nicaraguan government is exerting itself to restrain the populace. No indication has yet been given of an immediate intention to pay the indemnity, although the continued occupation of Corinto must prove very embarrassing to Nicaragua. Japan's Ambition to Progress and De velop.

The"Journal des Debats" Paris, publishes s report of an interview with Mr. Sone Arasuke Japanese minister to France, upon the resul of the China-Japanese war. The minister declared that European trade would be unable to withstand the competition of Japan. This, however, he said, was purely a pecuni-ary question and could be modified in accor-dance with the adoption by European countries of a bi-metallic standard or the retention of the existing standard.

Japan, he said, does not project any con-quests. Her one ambition is to advance in the path of progress and develop the trade and industries of the country she has recently acquired. The fears of Spain that Japan will encroach upon the Phillipine islands, the minister said, are groundless. Japan is satisfied with the possession of Formosa.

SCIENTIFIC EXHIBITION.

It Will Start from Philadelphia to Cruise About the Arctic Regions.

A scientific expidition in the interest of the Academy of Natural Sciences will start from Philadelphia for Alaska, to last four or five months. Dr. Benjamin Sharp and John M. Justice make up the party. They will leave on the United States revenue cutter Bear, which is the flagship of the American fleet in the Arctic waters,

The expedition is practically in search of

botanical specimens, birds, mammals, and marine invertebrates. Sili, as Dr. Sharp characteristicaly expressed it, they'll take everything they can lay their hands upon.

RAILROAD MEN IN A ROBBERY They Cleaned out a Station at Dunfee, Ind., of Everything of Value.

Smith, the telegraph operator, at the point of pistols, to change the signals so that a of pistols, to change the signal so that a freight train that was approaching would pass without stopping. As the train went by they took \$80 from Smith's pockets, tore, his diamond pin from his necktie, robbed the ticket office of money and select every article of value in sight. The men were railroaders, as they knew all about the train signals, knew all about train orders, and one of them understood telegraphing train orders.

COLUMBIA A SPEEDY SHIP.

The Triple Screw Cruiser Breaks the Record to Kingston.

The United States cruisers New York and Columbia arrived at New York from Key West, All the officers praise the Columbia, which made the run from here to Kingston, Jamaica, in three days and 23 hours, under half boiler power, thus breaking the record. An average of 14 knots was made with only two of her three screws on the way down.

Silent Signals.

In addition to reducing telephone rates the Cleveland Telephone Company will put in entirely new "central" apparatus by which signal bells will be replaced by miniature electric lights. A subscriber in calling the "central" will not ring a bell, but will simply remove the earphone from the hook. This will flash a light on the switchboard at the exchange. By this means the operator at "central," after making a connection can tell at a glance at any time just what the condition of the line is at any moment, and will not have to listen or break in on the conversation to flad if the subscribers are talk-

Finances of the Standard. The annual report of the Standard Oil company states the capital stock to be \$7,000,000, and the amount actually paid in \$7,000,000. The debts of the company do not exceed \$3,000,030, and the existing assets are at least \$10,000,000.
