

Joe Lusher and General Coxey.

The Editor of the Times had the pleasure of meeting General Coxey at the railroad station in Sunbury last Wednesday, a few minutes before the train left for Lewistown, the one he wished to board for his home in Massilon, Ohio. He is a pleasant man to meet and was willing to converse on the issues of the day. When he learned we were from Selinsgrove, Mr. Coxey said, "That is my birth place, but left your town when quite young, with my parents, who located in Danville, after which I removed to Massilon, Ohio, where I have since resided." After boarding the train for Lewistown in company with Ed. M. Hummel, we asked the General to give us his opinion of the political situation. He said:

"I am a Populist and will support the candidate for that party for President. I am making speeches every day throughout the country. I am for silver, 16 to 1, but that is not the only thing that must be done to relieve the times. That will help, but we must adopt the issue of loans to the State, counties and municipalities without interest, say for thirty-five years, use the money in making good roads and other improvements that will afford employment to good American citizens who to-day have no work. I am in favor of carrying that work on until the times improve, then stop until we have hard times again. I am in favor of towns, and cities building their own electric plants, water works, etc., on money loaned them by the Government, the loan to be paid back at the rate of four per cent. per annum, without interest. By doing this the municipalities will eventually derive sufficient funds from the money invested, to do away with local taxation. The present rate of interest is the cause of the financial stagnation throughout the country."

By this time we had reached Selinsgrove, and the general assured us that if desired and a date could be arranged, when he makes his speaking tour through this state, he would be glad to speak at Selinsgrove, his birth place.—Times.

Hon. S. P. Wolverton was called to Drifton Monday morning by a telegram stating that his friend Eckley B. Coxey, the great coal and railway magnate, was dangerously ill with pneumonia and wished to see him. A special train in charge of Conductor William Marvess took Mr. Wolverton over the Sunbury division as far as Hazleton. The train left Sunbury at 6:20 o'clock and the run to Hazleton was one of the fastest ever made over the division. From that point the run to Drifton was made by a special on the D. S. and S. Mr. Coxey died twenty minutes before Mr. Wolverton arrived.—Sunbury Item.

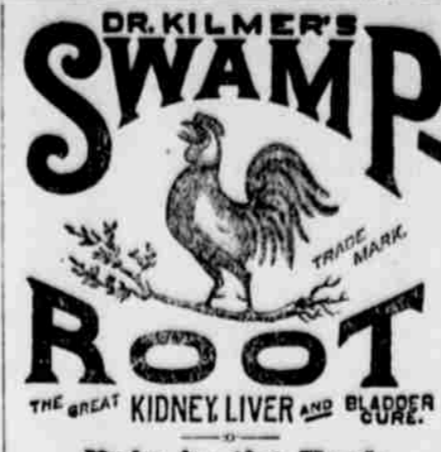

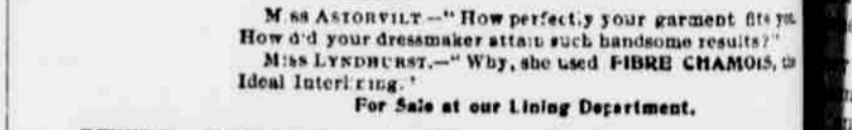
