

do anything for them. The members from the country have not changed front and most of them will vote against the measure and the chances are that it will be killed if called up. Representative Kunkel of Harrisburg who has the bill in charge is working earnestly to secure its passage. The bill will likely be called up some time during the week.

Eel Pots.

The eel pot bill, introduced by Focht at the request of the President of the Fish Commission, passed the House finally with a bare constitutional majority. It provides for the use of eel pots in other than trout streams. If Senator Green and a few other of the sporting senators don't kick long and hard the bill may become a law.

School Boards need not hoist the Flag over or near a School House.

Senator Landis' bill, which provides that school boards shall purchase out of the school funds American flags made of American hunting by American workmen, and shall float them over or near their respective school buildings, was defeated on final passage even after the bill was amended so that it was left discretionary with school boards. It was supposed that the bill would go through in its amended form but the House felt that school funds could be appropriated to better advantage.

Several rather unusual incidents.

On Tuesday of last week during the afternoon session a call of the roll disclosed the fact that a quorum failed to vote on a bill then under consideration. Speaker Walton immediately ordered the sergeant at arms to close the doors in order that a call of the House could be made. Before the doors had all been closed the news spread to the halls and ante-rooms and at once there was influx of statesmen and when the roll was called, 173 responded. Of course all answered to their names and nobody was in contempt. The doors were opened and the mill ground in its usual way. At this time your correspondent was within the breastworks and suffered no discomforts.

This little episode caused but a ripple on the legislative sea which soon ebbed away. It was not until Friday afternoon that the breakers swept over this perturbed body. Statesmen both great and small met at 9 o'clock on this eventful day but only scarcely a quorum. The week was one full of work, three sessions being crowded into a single day. A number left during Thursday night for the last visit home before the final adjournment; others left during the forenoon and so on until the vote on a motion to consider a postponed Senate bill showed that less than a quorum voted. This was probably an hour before the House usually adjourns. The speaker, no doubt, waxed warm, he ordered the sergeant at arms to remove all the Strangers from the floor of the House, close the doors, and permit no one to enter or leave. A roll call disclosed that but 95 members responded to their names. The Sergeant at Arms was directed to make diligent search for stragglers but succeeded in capturing but few who were conducted to the bar and promptly excused.

About 75 were absent who had neglected to get leave of absence which is only a farce at best and they will offer their reasons for leaving and be excused. The writer as has been his custom during the entire term left at 12:20 P. M. for some about half an hour before the usual hour for adjournment. We will with the rest answer for our leaving before the close of the session and be informed no doubt, that the good boys we must not do it again and the bluster will be over and nobody will be the better or the worse in consequence of it.

The Forestry Bill.
The Forestry Bill, which elicited prolonged discussion in the House and attracted no little attention throughout the State, has not yet made its way through the Senate and the chances are that it will allowed to die in the committee. This is quite as desirable as if it could succeed to become a law. The measure is cumbersome and unnecessarily complicated in addition containing features that would make it unpopular in agricultural communities generally. C. W. H.
