of politics, have endeared him
the members of the Republican
party throughout the length and
breadth of our great Country.

RESOLVED, That this Committee
designs Mr. B. F. Gilkeson for
public the official correspon-
dence of County Chairman Ar-
gast, and we regret that the
chairman of our State Central Com-
mittee should so flagrantly, willful-
and maliciously falsify the true
position and intent of the Snyder
county Republicans in the present
electoral contest, and his conduct in
selecting an official letter written
him in a sense of the utmost sin-
cidity and confidence, by one of his
county Chairmen, is highly repre-
sensible, ungentlemanly and lack-
ing in the ordinary relations of re-
spect and privacy existing between

men, in the transaction of affairs,
and it is the sense of this Committee
that such a man is unworthy the
confidence of the party at large, and
being charged with having expend-
ed \$100,000.00 without accounting
therefor, in the last campaign, we
believe that the lack of sagacity,
the marked impertinacity and the
official penuriousness of the State
Chairman, as exhibited in his recent
conduct, render him unfit longer to
continue at the head of the Republi-
can Party in Pennsylvania especy-

ally when a leader of so high capacity
and approved merits as Senator
Quay aspires to the position.

The County Chairman, Mr. Ar-
gast did not ask Mr. Gilkeson for
any State Funds to help pay for
holding a Primary Election, but
under the rules of the Party in
Snyder County, a candidate seeking
the votes of the Republicans is ex-
pected to pay an assessment. If
Mr. Gilkeson had stooped (?) to re-
ply to Mr. Argast's letter stating
that he did not care to submit his
name to the voters of the County,

no one would have any reason to
censure him. But under the cir-
cumstances he not only made public
private correspondence, but grossly
and basely misrepresented it.

RESOLVED, That we as Republi-
cans, who love party above cliques
do most heartily deplore the present
unnecessary warfare waged upon
Senator Quay, and ask the leaders
of the Party to harmonize the dif-
ficulties by the division of honors.

The Republicans of Snyder County
