#### A Rig Church to Be Moved Bodily.

If the building mover who signs the contract to move Immanuel Baptist Church, Michigan avenue, near Twenty-third street, successfully performs the work, says the Chicago Tribune, he will have done one of the most remarkable feats of building moving ever known. The contract calls for the moving of the church in its entirety fifty feet south and nine feet east, and it is an undertaking well covered with risks.

Immanuel Church is built of stone, has a self-supporting roof, and to the eye of a builder has the appearance of a big nut-shell. There is a sixty-feet steeple on the top of this church. With all the risky features in connection with the project there are two contractors willing to do the job, and their bids on the work are now under consideration.

When the idea of moving the massive hollow structure with its towering spire was first broached it was isnghed at by many, but the people who wanted the church moved knew what they were talking about. These were the proprietors of a hotel, whose interest it was to have the edifice a little further south, because it darkened all of the best rooms in the hostelry-those of the south exposure.

The hotel company buys the fifty feet of property south of the church property from B. F. Jacobs for \$30,-000, and deeds it to the Immanuel Church. It pays the expense of moving the churck, its reconstruction and redecorating. It is estimated that this part of the job will cost \$65,000. The trustees of the church, in exchange for the property bought from Jacobs, relinquish to the hotel company the open fifty feet created by the removal of the church. The removal does not cost the church a cent.

#### An Unsuspected Cause of Suffering.

A scientist gives an account of a man who was admitted to a hospital with a severe and obstinate case of inflammation of the eyes, face and hands, Ordinary applications gave no relief. and a thorough microscopic examina-

tion of the affected part was resorted to. This proved the existence of thonsands of tiny hairs, not unlike in appearance those from the caterpillar. They had entered the skin and produced this violent irritation. The plants which the man had been working with were examined, and it was found that a variety of the primrose was the offender. The downy-looking hairs on the leaves were sufficiently rigid to prick through the skin, and each one was charged with a poison after the fashion of the fangs of a snake. The doctor extracted this poison, which he used as a subcutaneous injection in the cases of several patients. He claims excellent results from this method of treating various obstinate skin diseases. In the same connection it may be stated that experiments in the treatment of cancer have been tried with satisfactory results. An animal was inoculated with cancerous material, then after a suitable period, the serum of the blood was collected and two cancer patients were innoculated with it. In both cases there was an almost immediate and positive improvement. Sufficient time has not-elapsed fully to test this discovery, but it certainly has great possibilities, as even though patients are only temporarily benefited, there is encouragement enough to persevere antil the longed-for ultimatum is reached .- New York Ledger.

sities and conditions.

The platform further declares for home rule in all local affairs; better roads; legisla tion in the interests of labor: Feberal taxation for revenue only; gold and silver as the only legal tender; rapid maintenance of the re-served rights of the States, and the vigorous

enforcement of the Monroe doctrine. Senator Hill failed to secure "harmony" in the convention, and the Grace-Fairchild peo-ple—the State Democracy—bolted the con-vention.

#### TRADE IN THE BALANCE.

Developments of the Pest Week Encour-

aging in Some Branches. R. G. Dun & Co., in their weekly review of trade say: About 1,800 commercial failures for the third quarter of 1895 show liabilities of about \$30,000,000, of which about \$11,000,-000 have been of manufacturing and \$17,000,000 of trading concerns. In the same quarter of last year the failures were 2,868 and the liabilities \$29,411,196, of which \$12,231,992 were of manufacturing and \$12,181,230 of trading concerns.

The week's reports are highly encouraging as to monetary matters although exports of gold still continue, and also as to the cotton manufacture, but not as satisfactory regarding iron, woolen, leather or silk manufac-

Prices of cotton goods rise each week, ding to the profit of mills, which on both sides of the ocean can use for some time to come old cotton bought at low prices. Some of the largest Pittsburg fron and steel concerns, professing to have orders for many months ahead, are bidding for small contrasts to Period to the contrasts of the co menths ahead, are bidding for small contracts in Eastern markets at \$1 to \$1.50 per ton less than the quoted rate. Some say that it is done to depress the market, and again it is thought that fhe biject may be to buy materials, but contracts have been made in the East for 250,000 tons of foreign ore, to be used in Beisemer iron making at Eastern furnaces, and the termination of the Marquette strike sets free about 500,000 tons more of Bessemer ore within the period of take navigation. The strike of coke worthers take navigation. The strike of coke workers at Cohnellaville, Pa., seems to have been avoided. For the first week in many menths the average of prices of iron and steel products show no change whatever, though the demand for finished products is distinctly re-

Fallures for the week have been 216 in the United States, against 235 last year, and 50 in Canada, against 56 inst year.


