It would apply to a great many more industries if they had received in the past years the encouragement to which they are entitled. This country ought, for instance, to be exporting tin plate in large quantities, instead of buying it from Great Britain. The flippant writers who clamor for the development of our export trade by open-ing the gates to foreign products of all kinds do not know how American manufacturers have with difficulty acquired a footing abroad and retained it. Protection enabled them to do it.


