PROTECTION'S POLICY.

Establish Home Industries and Increase Foreign Exports.

Protectionists desire earnestly an expansion of our export trade. Their policy is to establish firmly home industries and let American ingenuity and enterprise do the rest. Thus the manufacture of watches at Waltham, Mass., Elgin, Ill., and elsewhere has been followed by the export of American watches to Europe, Mexico, South America and Australia. This export trade is due primarily to the success attained at home under protection.

If we did not make good watches at Waltham and elsewhere, we could not have encountered Swiss competition abroad. What is true of the watch industry is true of many others. It would apply to a great many more industries if they had received in the past years the encouragement to which they are entitled. This country ought, for instance, to be exporting tin plate in large quantities, instead of buying it from Great Britain. The flippant writers who clamor for the development of our export trade by opening the gates to foreign products of all kinds do not know how American manufacturers have with difficulty acquired a footing abroad and retained it. Protection enabled them to do it.

THE BRITISH BOND AGE.

Result of Three Years of Democratic Meddling With Finance.

There have been already three bond sales under the Cleveland administration, amounting to over \$100,000,000, ranging from 9 1/2 years to 30 years in length of time, when they will fall due, and bearing interest at 4 and 5 per cent.

The charge thus saddled upon the country by taking away the duties on imports, which would have made the bond sales unnecessary, makes the following startling aggregate:

Principal.	Total Interest.
\$50,000,000 at 5 per cent., 10 years ..	\$25,000,000
50,000,000 at 5 per cent., 24 years ..	23,750,000
50,000,000 at 4 per cent., 30 years ..	24,750,000
\$150,000,000	\$73,500,000

This makes a total of principal and interest of \$233,500,000, representing less than three years of Democratic meddling with the finances of the country, and immediately following an administration under which the national debt was being speedily reduced, the national reserve fund augmented and unprecedented prosperity prevailing throughout the land.—Irish World.
