

## OFFICERS SHOOT LYNCHERS

TWO KILLED.

Two Men Killed In an Attack on the Timn Jail.

Henry Mutchler, Jr., and Christian Mata were shot and killed at Time, O., shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning by sheriff's officers. They were among a mob that tried to force an entrance to the jall and lynch Leander J. Martin, alias Williams, who was in confinement on the charge of killing City Marshai August Schultz, on Wednesday night. Martin got into a controversy with the 15-year-old son of a neighboring farmer and had

year-old son of a neighboring farmer and had nearly strangled him. Schuitz and Officer Sweeney went to Martin's farm to arrest bim, but he barricaded himself in his house, and shot from the window at the officers, killing Schuitz and wounding Sweeney. Schuitz's funeral drew a great crowd and there was much talk of lynching Martin. Sheriff Van Neas heard of this and took the precaution of standing a half dozen well armed guards inside the jail. At midnight the mob, which was mostly composed of farmers from the vachnity, met at the fair grounds and marched to lynch Martin. grounds and matched to lynch Martin.
They marched into the town and made a
rush upon the jail. Some carried sledge
hammers, with which they smashed the
door separating the sheriff's residence from

Speriff Van Ness met the leaders of the Sheriff van Ness met the leaders of the mob and warned them to withdraw. He faced the throng with his revolver in his hand, but they quickly wrested his weapon from his grasp. Then they broke open the solid steel door which leads into the jail. The guards first fired a voiley into the celling from their rifles, and as the mob still pressed on they shot into the crowd, instantic killing Mutchler and Matr. Some of the ly killing Mutchler and Matr. Some of the farmers went out to look for dynamite with which to destroy the jail and its inmates, and while they weregone Officers McSweeney and Fankner took Martin out by a rear door, placed him in a cab and drove him 24 miles to Fremont, where he was placed in jail,

to Fremont, where he was placed in jail.
At daylight Sunday morning excited crowd
began to gather again in the vicinity of the
jail, and sheriff Van Ness called out Company C. of the Sixteenth regiment of the
Ohio National Guard, which has its headquarters at Tiffin. The company not being
very strong, the sheriff telegraphed Gov. Mckinley for more troops. The Governor responded by ordering companies from Fremont. Sandurky, Kenton and Toledo, and there are 360 soldiers in and around the jail. Col. Kounts, of Toledo, is the ranking officer in command.

The authorities at Fremont, fearing that

the mob might travel the 18 miles separating that city from Tiffin, wired that they had sent the murderer to Cleveland.

#### BOOM IN TIN PLATE.

Big Advances Made in That Industry for the Year Ending June 30.

Special Treasury Agent Ayre was recently instructed to ascertain and report upon the condition of the tin plate industry in the United States, and has just submitted his re-

port to the department at Washington.

The report covers the operations of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895. The facts presented show a marked increase in the black plates' which form the body of com-mercial tin. The largely increased consump-tion of steel sheets from American rolling mills indicates not only the accelerated growth of this branch of the industry, but an actual preference for American rolled sheets. During the year the production of the United States was 193.801,073 pounds, an increase of States was 193.801,073 pounds, an increase of the contract of 30 per cent over the previous year. Forty-eight firms were producing during the quarter ended June 30, 1835, against forty the previous year.

Twenty-eight rolling mills were producing

black plates during the quarter against 20 during the same quarter in 1894.

Of the 48 firms that were producing com-mercial tin and terne plates during the quar-ter ended June 30, 1895, 39 used wholly American plates, nine used both American and foreign plates. No firm used wholly forproportion of American sheets used

during the quarter ended June 30, 1895, cofi-pared with the entire production of com-mercial tin and terne plates was 93 per cent. against 72 per cent, used the previous year.

During the year eight firms permanently discontinued production. Twenty-six new firms engaged in the active business during the year, of which 17 are making or preparing to make black plates.

## WINDOW GLASS ADVANCE

The Price Will go up About 121.2 Per

The western window glass syndicate, including all the window giass houses west of Patsburg, aunounce that they will make another rise in the price of glass, this time about 12 1-2 per cent. The advance in price will either be effected on the 1st or 10th of the coming month. This syndicate, which was formed of the 8th of July, with but 13 Indiana plants, now controls the market, and it has since that time raise the price of glass 25 per cent. This raise will outloom of the sent of the 25 per cent. This raise will put some grades nearly 40 per cent higher than they were last year. The eastern syndicate, controlling all of the plants east of Fittsburg, will work in connection, and the raise will be general. The demand is good, and the outlook is the best in years. Almost all of the old stock has been worked off, although there were 350,000 boxes on hand July S. This shows a great demand. great demand.

Miners R sume Work.

At the mass meeting of the Clearfield re-gion miners, held at Ramey, Pa., the miners voted against suspending work. A committee will be sent to Philadelphia to present the re-quest for an increase in wages to the Berwind-White Coat Mining Company, and fail-ing, to ask for a joint conference of operators and miners to be held on November 10. Pending the report of this committee the executive board ordered all miners to resume work excepting those in the employ of the Bell, Lewis & Yates and Rochester & Pitts burg companies.

Russo-China Treaty.

The correspondent of the London Times at Hong Kong learned from a reliable source that by the recently concluded Russo China trenty Russia obtains rights to anchor her fleet at Port Arthur, and to construct and work, under Russian administration, railways from Nertehinsk and Tsitihur to Viadi, vostock, and from Tsiteihar to Port Archue tegether with other commercial advantages to which the most favored nation clause is not applicable. But the Chinese reserve the option to purchase the railways 2) years hence at a price to be arranged hereafter.




