How Will a Test Result?

The Beavertown correspondent to the Herald last week says:

"In last week's issue of the Post an article appeared which the teachers of the west end of the county think needs a reply. It stated that comparatively few teachers of the present times were reading papers. This undoubtedly is an idea of an old 'way-back' who knows very little of the teachers of the present day. Because the teachers of the present, as our Co. Supt. knows, and must keep abreast with the times and current events or he is not 'in it.' The teachers of the west end of good old Snyder regard the article as a slur upon their profession and declare that they read as many educational and newspaper as some of the Editors or any other person; we feel safe in saying that there are very few teachers in the county who are not regular newspaper readers. They furthermore deem any body welcome to any benefit he may derive from publication."

We shall be only too glad to learn that we had been misinformed concerning the reading habits of the teachers of Snyder county. It will be the happiest development of this week's institute to learn that the teachers as a class are newspaper readers. We know that many teachers do read the papers. It was not for this class that the editorial was written. The article was put forth as an eye opener for those who do not read. The editorial can in no wise be considered a slur upon those who do read the newspapers, but as a compliment to them. On the other hand, to those who do not freely read the newspapers, such admonition is timely. It is for this latter class that the advice was given and is one of the salient points that go to make up the qualifications of a wide awake teacher.

We propose to make a test of the reading habits of every teacher in the county.

The Middleburgh Post contains a list of 306 books which will be given away to new subscribers and to those who pay in advance. In the list will be found books by such famous authors as Thomas Carlyle, Washington Irving, W. M. Thackeray, J. Fenimore Cooper, George Eliot and many others.

The Middleburgh Post has made a special effort toward placing teachers and prospective teachers in a position to secure the best possible training for their work. To this end the Post has given away about \$300 in scholarships at the Bloomsburg State Normal School as prizes. This should stamp the Post as a friend of the teachers and not as the correspondent from Beavertown prefers to assume, "a slur to the teachers." We prefer to believe, however, that the correspondent was led astray by attributing wrong motives to the Editor's desire to inculcate a reading habit where it does not exist. We know that the Herald's correspondent reads the Post and appreciates its service in behalf of intellectual progress.

We prefer to believe that we were mistaken in our former editorial and now take the privilege of putting the matter of reading to the teachers of the county and await results.

A Historical Character Dies.

In the death of Daniel Stuck, late of West Perry Township, the oldest resident of the county and a descendant of the famous Stuck family has passed away. He died November 11th at the good old age of 97 years, 2 months and 20 days. In 1781 his stepmother and her two sons were killed by the Indians in the well known Stuck Massacre near Creamer.

It appears that the men belonging to the family were at work in the fields when a party of Indians who had been secreted in the woods close by swooped down upon the defenceless women and immediately tomahawked Mrs. Stuck, while she was in the act of defending herself with a canoe pole. Having dispatched her outright, the redskins also killed two of the children and a man who happened to be near. They then scalped their victims and seizing young Mrs. Stuck, the wife of one of the Stuck boys, proceeded to carry her away with them into the forest. Overcome with the horrible scenes she had beheld, the young woman faint-

ed before they reached the woods with her, when she also was put to death by the tomahawk and dragging her for a considerable distance into the thickets she was scalped and left a prey to the birds and animals.

The entire settlement immediately became aroused at the sudden onslaught and sent for three well known Indian fighters then living or being at the time at what is known as the Shamokin Dam, Snyder county, by the name of Grove, Pence and Stroh and accompanied with these brave and resolute men, the settlers started in pursuit to capture the marauding Indians. They made off in the direction of the New York Border where they were overtaken and killed by the white pursuers in the course of a few days, while sitting about their fires in the forest, recounting, doubtless the incidents of their expedition.
