A correspondent to the Lewisburg Chronicle says: "Since Dr. Ferrine wrote an interesting article in the University Magazine in which he says that the term University is misapplied in the case of Bucknell, because the local institution only pretends to give a thorough collegiate education, there has been some talk of dropping the University or substituting a more appropriate word. At the banquet of the Alumni club in Philadelphia recently, a speaker suggested that the word University be abandoned. If any change is made, how would Bucknell College suit the people?"

This, coming as it does from an officer of the institution, is taking a laudable stand. Bucknell is not a University and neither is our own institution at Selinsgrove. We believe it would be far more consistent if Bucknell University and Susquehanna University would substitute the name college instead of the name University.

George Eby, who departed this life after a short illness on Thursday, was born in Manchester, Lancaster county, Pa., October 1819. His boyhood days were divided between the place of his birth and Lebanon, coming to Selinsgrove in 1854. January 19th, 1841, he was married to Maria Gingrich, the fruits of which marriage were four sons, three of whom are still living, Charles having died when aged 5 years. The deceased lived for a short time in the lower end of town; but, feeling the necessity of owning a home, built a house on Walnut street where he has since lived. Success to this his wife Maria died. In 1858 he was again married to Margaret A. Sardy, of Lewisburg, the fruits of this marriage were three daughters. Finding the old home growing too small and inconvenient, in 1870 he built a comfortable three story brick. The great fire of 1874 swept all away and he had to begin life anew when 55 years old. Sorely discouraged, but possessed of indomitable will and energy, he raised from the ashes the pleasant home which stands an honor to his courage and perseverance. Among the many years of his residence at Selinsgrove he filled many positions of trust and never forfeited the confidence reposed in him. For a number of years he collected the County and Borough taxes. In 1860, assisted by his son, Amantes M., he made the Census enumeration for the Borough, Union, Penn., Washington and Chapman township. He was for three successive terms elected as Justice-of-the-Peace, and the title of "Squire Eby" was always given him. He united with Lafayette Lodge, 194, F. & A. M. in 1847, for 48 years being a true and consistent Mason, being the oldest member and Past Master of this Lodge. He was honest and just in his dealings with men, a true and loving husband, and a good and indulgent parent. He leaves a good and loving wife, the companion of his joys and sorrows for 38 years, six children and a large circle of friends to mourn his loss. James W., the eldest son is living in California, Amantes M., Treasurer of the Co. Pardee works, at Perth Amboy, N. J., and Sylvester G., engaged in mercantile pursuits at Weatherly, Pa., Mrs. H. W. Hummel, resident at Northumberland, Pa., Mrs. Arthur Carey, located at Huntingdon, and Miss Lottie F., still a member of the parental household.
