In 1860, assisted by his son, Amantes M., he made the Census enumeration for the Borough, Union, Penn, Washington and Chapman township. He was for three successive terms elected as Justice-of-the-Peace, and the title of "Squire Eby" was always given him. He united with Lafayette Lodge, 194, F. & A. M. in 1847, for 48 years being a true and consistent Mason, being the oldest member and Past Master of this Lodge. He was honest and just in his dealings with men, a true and loving husband, and a good and indulgent parent. He leaves a good and loving wife, the companion of his joys and sorrows for 38 years, six children and a large circle of friends to mourn his loss.
