Leshner Willfully Misrepresents.

It is not our sphere nor our intention to use editorial columns in this primary campaign, but we have been viciously misrepresented in last week's Times and we desire simply to explain that Leshner lies. He desires to make it appear that the Editor of this paper is an applicant for the Middleburgh Post Office. Leshner deserves no reply to such a misrepresentation. We will say to the Republican voters of Snyder county and more especially to the patrons of the Post Office in this place that we are not an applicant for the Postmastership at this place and we will not be an applicant under the incoming administration. It does not belong to us, Middleburgh has plenty of good republican war horses that have lived in this town for many years and have been faithful to the republican party and one of these gentlemen will be our next postmaster. It is not for us to say who he will be, but his name will not be Wagenseller. This nails one lie completely.

The second is like unto this. A few days ago a special was published in the Phila. Inquirer dated at Middleburgh. The Democratic editor is very magnanimous in crediting the authorship to us. The special was not written by us and was not written in this town, as we have since learned.

The third is as infamous a misrepresentation as the other two. He would make it appear that the war Barrios has allowed him to publish in his office, or that he would consult the wife of the editor.

Fourth. The Democratic apostle has no more authority to state that we are for Doctor Wagenseller for State Senator, than he has to state that we are for Hummel or Toole. The columns of the Post were thrown open to all alike at the same rates and what is more, the Post is for either of the three candidates the republicans nominate. They are all three good men and we lament the fact that such a degree of animosity has been engendered among the most intimate of friends.

Fifth. The apostle who was banished from democratic confidence and esteem says that the editor of the Post is to be made county chairman. We assure this chief of prevaricators that we are not a candidate for this position and will not be. It is useless to state any reasons beyond the allusion to the little flurry in local politics, which is well understood by those most interested.

Sixth. The ex-disciple of the democratic temple has started a rumor and we understand intends to use it in his sheet this week to the effect that this paper charged one of the candidates more than another for the publication of political matter. We have sent a special letter to the persons most interested assuring them that the report was false and asking as a matter of justice to abide by the truth. If it is used, it is used with the full knowledge that it is false and such wholesale lying should be rebuked. Our course has been straight and all candidates are treated impartially. If one candidate offers more material than another, it is no doing of ours. We would prefer to have one candidate use as much space as the other, but the course is of their own choosing, hence we are relieved of the responsibility. In conclusion we exhort all republicans to consider carefully the qualifications of all the candidates from Congress down to Delegate and vote for those you consider best. Don't allow any one to stir up a factional quarrel in our party, but march boldly to the front and vote for the highest principles ever advocated in the land of freedom.
